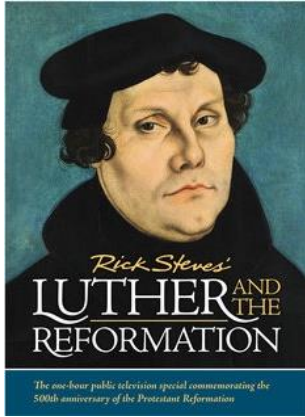


Week Five - April 5

Five hundred years ago, Martin Luther kicked off the Reformation, which ultimately split western European Christianity in two: Catholic

and Protestant. Rick Steves travels in the footsteps of Martin Luther—distilling the story of that bold monk, the chaos of the Reformation, and the larger political, economic, and theological context. In this one-hour public television special — filmed on location in Germany and Rome — Steves traces the dramatic events of this grassroots movement that changed the course of history.

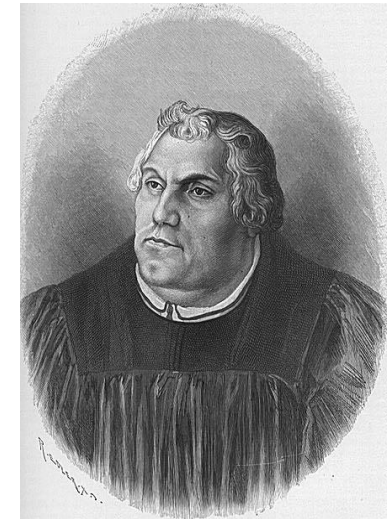
