## NEW CROSS FOR FELLOWSHIP HALL

A new free-standing cross in Fellowship Hall was dedicated to the Glory of God at the 10:45 a.m. Contemporary Service on Easter Sunday. The solid wooden cross, made entirely of American chestnut, was designed and created by Ronald H. Kerr, and paid for by an anonymous donor. Site Manager at Camp Nawakwa, Ron is well-known to our many Trinity campers. He is also well-known as a wood carver, and has created other beautiful pieces, including the crosses over the fireplaces at Nawakwa's Deitz, Zinn-Tozer and Brenneman Lodges. Pastor Nancy Easton said, "Not only will this graceful and grace-filled cross serve as a focal point for our worship in Fellowship Hall, but also it will be visible to those entering our building." She added, "This cross was a true labor of love for Ron. He loved working with that wonderful chestnut wood, and he loves serving his God. We are thankful for his considerable talent."

## RENEWING WORSHIP LITURGY

Trinity will soon make use of some of the ELCA's newest liturgical resources. During the season of Pentecost, we will learn and use portions of one setting from the *Renewing Worship* materials at the 11:00 a.m. Sunday service.

*Renewing Worship* is a series of provisional materials developed in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America which are being tried and tested in a variety of worship settings. These liturgical materials are grounded in the treasures of the church's tradition, while remaining open to new worship possibilities in the future. As stated by denomination officials, *Renewing Worship* is the "next generation of ELCA worship" and will aid congregations of the Church to focus on our mission to the world.

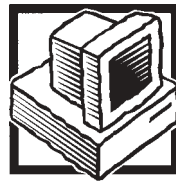

## STAFF NOTES

### Surprising Blooms

I'd forgotten I'd planted those crocuses. I recall burying the tiny bulbs in the backyard garden, but I hadn't remembered planting them in the front yard as well. Putting bulbs out front must have been an afterthought. There were a few extra bulbs and nowhere else to put them. So, in the corner, under the dogwood they went, only to be forgotten as winter came and snow blanketed the ground.

Until one day, when a neighbor said, "I like your crocuses!" That's when I noticed them. Purple and yellow and white, peeking their heads up out of the dirt, the first glimpse of spring in the midst of a cold, dreary rain. I liked those crocuses, too. Particularly because they did surprise me so. Just when I'd forgotten I'd placed the bulbs there, they appeared in all their beauty.

Our Christ-like acts are often like that. We plant seeds of love in many different places, and don't necessarily see the results . . . at least not right away. In fact, we might even forget a kindness shown, a word of grace bestowed, a moment of nurture and guidance, a healing touch given to someone else. Then God surprises us all by showing His power in the midst of what we did and it brings to full effect something wonderful in someone else's life.

On May 15, a number of young people in our congregation will affirm their baptism at our worship services. That Sunday we celebrate the Day of Pentecost, remembering the gift of God's Holy Spirit poured out upon his first disciples. We worship that day, giving praise to God for His continued gift of that precious Spirit in our lives, including the lives of these confirmands. I can't help but be grateful to their parents and grandparents—the ones who made promises at their baptism to tell them the story of Jesus Christ, to place scripture in their hands, to bring them into the fellowship of this faith community for worship and learning.

That kind of promise-keeping by parents and baptismal sponsors (*by the way, we members of the congregation are baptismal sponsors!*) is much like burying bulbs in the ground in November. Sometimes parents and Sunday School teachers, pastors and youth group leaders, confirmation mentors and presenters forget where they planted those bulbs, and wonder whether they planted them deep enough for the flowers to bloom. We may not see any growth at all over a period of time. But be assured that God continually surprises us by showing His power in the midst of all that we did and are still doing, and will bring to effect something wonderful in the lives of these young people.

Plenty of nurturing and care are involved in helping our young people grow in faith. However, May 15 does not mark the end of our responsibility in guiding our confirmands. They will continue to need us as they move on to high school and prepare for living faithfully in a challenging world. Rather than an end, May 15 marks a special beginning—a new partnership we will share with them as members of Trinity Lutheran Church. From that day on, we will go and plant more bulbs together—act in Christ-like ways in a unified ministry as the Church, as well as support one another in all our individual and uniquely-gifted ways.

And who knows where those flowers will bloom?

## KEEPING THE CREATOR IN EARTH DAY

What did you do on April 22 this year? That was Earth Day, the day of the year appointed to celebrate the creation.

For Christians, Earth Day began long before 1970. Celebration of the creation is as old as the book of Genesis, where God created the heavens and the earth, and declared them good. Biblical writers praise the creation from Job to the Psalms to the prophets and into the New Testament. Christian writers and hymnists, including Martin Luther, have lauded the beauty and majesty of the earth and its inhabitants for centuries.

Somewhere along the way, however, God disappeared from this celebration, and caring for the creation became falsely associated with nature worship. It's now time to put God back into Earth Day. Just as Christ must remain in Christmas, the Creator is inseparable from the celebration of his creation.

By viewing Earth Day from its proper Christian perspective, we can also have a healthier understanding of our responsibility in the stewardship of the planet. Scripture clearly states that we are to enjoy the bounty of the Lord's creation, but that we are also charged with its care. When God created the earth, he entrusted us with both the dominion over his creation and the responsibility to be good stewards of it.

We protect the earth from harm, not because we worship nature, but because we worship him who created it. We fight pollution in part because it harms the creation, but mostly because it harms the health of God's highest creation: humans.

Remember April 22, the day we celebrate God's Earth Day.

## BREAD FOR THE WORLD SUNDAY

*Bread for the World Sunday* at Trinity will be held May 22 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the Gathering Space. We have been asked once again to write letters to our representatives and senators to support legislation that moves us toward the goal of cutting United States food insecurity in half by 2010 and commit to the goal of ending hunger by 2015. Think on this. The United States is the only industrialized country that tolerates widespread child hunger. In fact, hunger has increased in our country in recent years. More than 36 million people, including 13 million children, are threatened by hunger. This is both unacceptable and solvable. Now is the time for us to be heard. We need your help. Please stop by the tables in the Gathering Space and take time to write your letter. Stationary, envelopes, and stamps will be provided. Help us to help these hungry people here in our own United States.

## DO YOU OWN A PIECE OF THE ROCK YET?

Have you joined our campaign to reduce Trinity's capital debt that resulted from the nearly \$4 million we spent in 2002 to expand and improve our facilities?

We sent you a pledge card to respond to the campaign in late February. The concept of the campaign is based on members of the congregation purchasing "shares" of our outstanding debt of \$1.6 million as of the end of 2004. Shares of the "ROCK" are \$1600 each. You can buy whole shares, half shares of \$800 each or even quarter shares of \$400 each. Of course, you can also purchase multiple shares. The contribution period to pay for the shares continues through April 2008 and can be completed at any time until then.

The active pledging period will end in late May, and we hope to be able to significantly reduce Trinity's outstanding debt. So, please prayerfully consider joining others to become strong stewards of the faith here at Trinity. Can't find your pledge card? Please call the church office at 737-8635, or pick up a card in the narthex or at the Gathering Space desk.

Remember, every dollar you pledge will go to reduce the principal and will mean less interest expense on the debt. This translates directly into more resources being available to pursue Christ's ministry and program in our wonderfully equipped facilities that God has so richly blessed us with.
