

STAFF Notes

"You're Welcome!"

It's occurred twice now, as I've purchased something at a local establishment I frequent. (This establishment shall remain nameless, since I intend to continue frequenting it.) Upon receiving the product I purchased, I said, "Thank you" to the clerk. She responded with, "Not a problem" and continued waiting on customers. The next week another clerk responded much the same way as the first to my "Thank you." "No problem," she said, and smiled.

The phrase "Not a problem" doesn't offend me. Both clerks said it with a friendly air, and served me promptly and graciously. I simply don't believe "Not a problem" is an adequate replacement for "You're welcome." While it may be a nifty slang expression, it just doesn't represent the fullness of "You are welcome." The reason I bring this up is not that I'm becoming some old etiquette curmudgeon. It has less to do with etiquette and much more to do with gratitude and generous giving.

To say "Thank you" is to express gratitude for something—an action taken or a word spoken. To say "You are welcome" in response is to express pleasure at the doing or saying of something which has elicited that gratitude. In other words, when I say to you, "You're welcome," it means I was *pleased* to do or say whatever it was for which you are grateful.

Remember the many times our Lord Jesus had to calm his worried and anxious disciples? They had trouble dealing with the unknown and unexpected things in life, particularly as they followed their teacher. So Jesus tried to reassure them of God's constant love and care for them. One verse I especially like is Luke 12:32, when Jesus says, "Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom."

How wonderful to know the *pleasure* God receives from giving life to us, showering us with blessings of love and mercy, bequeathing us a place in his kingdom! He gives to us endlessly, and we, in turn, have opportunity to say "Thank you"—as we pray, as we sing songs, and as we live each day trusting in him and serving for him.

Since it pleases God to give us his kingdom, how do you suppose God responds to our thankfulness? Do you suppose he offers the flip phrase "Not a problem"? No. While it pleased God to send his son Jesus Christ into our world to reclaim us, it was not an easy thing to do—after all, how could the Son going to the cross to die be "not a problem"? On the contrary, it was the most generous, painful and arduous giving God could do for his creation—suffering for us that we might live. *Yet it pleased him to do so.* Can we grasp that in our mere human minds? Perhaps not entirely, but it humbles me to realize how much God is pleased to bless his creation.

And I think I know how God responds to our words of gratitude and to any generous giving we do in his name. I can almost hear God saying, as we praise him with our lives, "My beloved children... you are most welcome."

YOUTH GROUP NEWS

Greetings to all in the name of the Lord. Since I never have that much to say over the summer months for YG NEWS, I thought that I would dedicate this space to one specific ministry. That ministry is the Harrisburg Area Confirmation Camp. The Harrisburg Confirmation Camp has existed every year since 1972. It started then with just a handful of inner city churches who thought that it would be a good idea to have a summer camp to really teach kids about confirmation. It has grown from around 30 or so participants that first year to well over 400 this year. Confirmation Camp began at Mount Luther and is now held at Nawakwa. It started with like five churches and now there are around 30 different churches that send kids. I have been going to camp for 16 years now. The focus in those early years was on the eighth graders and since then many other programs have been added for everyone in high school. After high school many youth have an opportunity to come back and help in the teaching as counselors. We hand pick around 40 counselors to help us every year. The different programs are for eighth graders and up. Eighth graders are the campers and their week focuses on all facets of baptism. Ninth graders are called GGP'S, which means God's Gifted People. Their week focuses on the gifts that they have been given by God. Tenth graders are known as MBC'S, which means Maturing in the Body of Christ. Their focus is to become a strong part of Christ's body through active discipleship. Eleventh graders have two options. First off, they can be LT'S, which is our Leadership Training curriculum. This trains them to be leaders not only in camp but in life. Or they can choose to be CLAY which focuses on using your artistic gifts in leadership. After that, if qualified, they can be called back as counselors to work with the staff in all of the various tracks. This year, we took down four CAMPERS, six GGP's, eight MBC's, two LT's, one CLAY, six COUNSELORS, and one STAFF (ME), for a total of 28 people. The weather was perfect and the kids learned a lot. It is a life-changing experience for so many people. We have large group worship, small groups, learning activities, service opportunities, and so much FUN! It is a blast and I look forward to it every year I go. It is such a powerful experience. Faith, fun, and fellowship are what it is all about. Nuff Said...

Bread for the World Sunday: Make Hunger History!

Thank you to everyone who took the time to write letters to our U.S. Senators and Representatives on the Bread for the World Sunday, May 22. While I have not received any communication from these Washington legislators, Bread for the World reports that the Hunger-Free Communities Act was introduced in the Senate on May 25 and in the House, on May 26. This legislation would commit our nation to cutting U.S. food insecurity and hunger in half by 2010.

Rep. Todd Platts (West Shore) is listed as a cosponsor of this legislation. Write or telephone Rep. Platts and thank him for signing on as a cosponsor to the Hunger-Free Communities Act of 2005 and to oppose cutting funding or compromising the entitlement status of the Food Stamps Program.

Neither Sens. Rick Santorum or Arlen Specter nor Rep. Tim Holden (East Shore) is listed as sponsors of this legislation. Please write another letter to Sens. Santorum and Specter and Rep. Holden to urge them to sign on as cosponsors.
