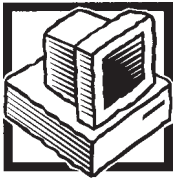

## Staff Notes

*A Pinch of This, a Pinch of That . . .*

Hmmmm . . . something’s missing . . . I thought I followed the recipe exactly, adding all the ingredients necessary . . . but it just doesn’t taste right. I know—I’ll add some more sugar. Maybe that’s what is missing. No, that’s not it either. I have enough sugar. I need something else . . .

Have you ever experienced that in the kitchen? The **absence** of one single ingredient can make all the difference in the world. And that particular ingredient’s **presence**? Well, as Julia Child used to say, *“Bon appetit!”*

But I’m dealing in metaphors here. It’s not cooking that I’m contemplating. I’m really talking about the Church, which is the Body of Christ. And the something (or shall I say, someone?) that is missing might just be **you**.

There is the you that has gotten out of the habit of regular worship. There is the you that skedaddles out the door on the last verse of the final hymn or song. There is the you that participates in worship gladly but offers few of your precious talents to the ministries of this congregation.

Some of our lessons during this Epiphany season deal with Jesus’ gathering of disciples. These earliest followers seemed to be initially gathered without much difficulty. But it was the keeping them gathered and focused that must have been hard. So Jesus constantly taught his disciples, patiently answered their many questions, and continually challenged them to serve like him. Jesus told his disciples they were the “salt of the earth.” (Matthew 5:13a) You see, he spoke in metaphors, too. He encouraged them to maintain their saltiness. In other words, their living out their faith would be noticed by the world, and would have incredible impact in the world. I encourage you to be salty.

That is part of what we’re about here at Trinity. It is a place not only to worship and give thanks to God, but it is also a place where we listen and learn from our Lord. Where we hear his patient answers to our questions, and where we receive his challenge to be salty, serving in his name. We all need this time for listening and learning. And we can help each other in the midst of that time, strengthening each other for the variety of ministries we do, both in this building and beyond.

As I often tell those attending our new members class, it is all too easy to be “anonymous” in a large congregation such as Trinity. All too easy to slip in and slip out. All too easy to remain disconnected from the rest of the Body. But trust me—you’re not truly anonymous. There are people here who genuinely miss you and all you have to offer as part of the Body.

How grateful I am for the part of the recipe **you** play—the flavoring you add to the life of Trinity and the communities in which you live and work. Our recipe is sorely lacking without you.

Lord help us to be neither too busy nor too weary nor too sorrowful to share the load that others have.

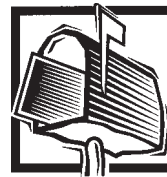
*We pray for your guidance, Lord.*

# From Your Director of Learning Ministries

## Sup-Well, "Soup,"-and Study

On the Wednesday evenings in Lent between Ash Wednesday and Holy Week, we will once again be having Sup and Study, a series of suppers together followed by special classes. The dates for Sup and Study are March 8, March 15, March 22, March 29, and April 5. Sup and Study is a program for everyone, for all ages. There will be special programming available for children and nursery care.

The time for Sup and Study is 5:30 to gather, 5:45 to dine, 6:30 to have classes. Classes conclude at 7:30.

This session will simplify the meals, which is not only more economical but more appropriate to the season of Lent itself, which is meant to be a time of shriving (of letting go the excess) and reflection. I am asking various groups in the church to accept the preparation for meals of soup, salad, bread, drink, and so on—each group preparing a single Wednesday meal. These groups can be classes, committees, Koinonoia groups, Bible studies, etc. The food will be paid for out of the church's education budget.

There will be five classes for Sup and Study for adults to choose from: an introduction to theology for laypersons, a class on forgiveness, sessions on *Renewing Worship* (the new, upcoming hymnal for the Lutheran Church), Family Caregiving to help those caring for a loved one who suffers from chronic illness or disabilities, and a class on parenting parents (on children dealing with parental issues, once both children and parents are much older).

Children in the children's choir, and those wishing to try the choir, will meet with Amy Koch during the class time. For those children not singing, there will be separate programming.

Please look for registration information on Sup and Study in the Gathering Space in the next couple of weeks. The cost for the meals will be the same as last time—six dollars per person per meal, a maximum of twenty dollars per family. When registering, particularly as a family, please make sure that all persons, adults and children of any age, are listed.

Come fall we will have another Sup and Study series, this time noting the season of harvest by sharing in fuller, catered meals. The cost will be the same, though. Keep in mind that participants in Sup and Study may just attend the classes or even just the meals.

If you have questions regarding Sup and Study, please feel free to contact me. Sup and Study is a unique time for community at Trinity. Hope to see you then and there!

## From the Missions Corner

With funds available to distribute at the end of the year, the Missions Committee voted to send money to a new mission field in China, China Service Ventures. I heard about this mission at the Global Missions Event in August. Pastor Steve Ray impressed me with his enthusiasm and with his sincerity about bringing the message of Christ to those in the Henan Province of China. China Service Ventures is committed to fostering enriching relationships between Christian communities and individuals in North America with individuals and communities in China. They do this through prayer, learning about China, exchanging resources and personnel, and the development of service projects that benefit the Chinese people. The Province of Henan, in central China, has nearly 100 million people in an area only a little larger than Minnesota. It is a poor rural province subject to drought and flooding, thus harvest can be uncertain. High population density, scarcity of resources, extensive adult illiteracy and the cycle that breeds poverty and illness prevails. Since the mission field is now opening up in China once again, the committee felt that this was a way for us to help in bringing Christ back to the people. Another \$500 has been added to our missions support for the year 2006.

## From the Vicar

Greetings in Christ!

I want to share with you a ministry that is very close to my heart. If you read my article in the December issue of *Trinity Parish*, you know that I have been involved in prison ministry while serving my intern year here at Trinity. Every week I go over to the Dauphin County Prison and work in the chaplain's office. I interview newly incarcerated people to find out their spiritual needs and explain the services provided by the chaplain's office. I also talk to inmates and participate in worship. What I have learned from the inmates is that people are just people. Inside the walls or outside we are all children of our Heavenly Father who loves us and calls us to be His own. Inmates struggle with many of the same problems and worries that anyone else does. They have the same fears, joys, and needs as anyone else. The difference is that they do all these things in a prison. These are men and women who have made mistakes and are paying for them. I believe that while all of us need to take responsibility for our actions and choices, and that those who are incarcerated are there for a reason, I also believe that everyone needs to know that God loves them. Everyone! And since these children of God can't come and worship with us and have community here with us, we must go to them and meet them where they are just as Jesus does.

I believe we are called to minister to those in prison by Jesus who says "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:31). But are those in prison our neighbors? Jesus said "I was in prison and you visited me. . . I assure you, when you (visited) one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me" (Matthew 25:36).

Beginning on February 19, Chaplain Larry Coleman of the Dauphin County prison, and I, will be leading a special topics class on Sunday morning about prison ministry. The topics included will be: the **why** of prison ministry; how to be a part of prison ministry; and what you can do in prison ministry. We will also be talking about becoming a mentor.

What is a mentor? A mentor is someone who is willing to commit to walking with the incarcerated and recently released inmate as they attempt to find a better way. Mentoring involves visiting those in prison and forming a relationship; helping the inmate to navigate the world outside the prison; becoming a resource and a guide. A mentor does not do things for the former inmate or provide any monetary support. Rather the mentor is more like a guide, a listening ear, and a friend. A mentor makes a commitment to walk with someone and guide them as they make a new life for themselves after incarceration.

The class begins on Sunday, February 19, at 9:30 a.m., and will meet for three Sundays.

I ask that you pray about this ministry and for those who are incarcerated, that they never be forgotten.

As many of you are aware, my goal for 2005 was 200 units of blood even though the Central PA Blood Bank sets our goal at 109 units! We almost made it! In 2005, Trinity Blood Bank collected 199 units. This compares to 165 units in 2004! I talked to my contact at the Central Pennsylvania Blood Bank to get this number and her comment was, "You be sure to pass along many, many thanks from CPBB. We certainly appreciate the help we get from Trinity Lutheran, Camp Hill."

Thank you very much to our faithful donors since this is a record for Trinity's Blood Bank. The January 15 visit from the Central PA Blood Bank was a great success and we have also been getting many more donors at the hospitals, donor centers, and Community Blood Drives. Remember to tell them #157.

This year the CPBB will need in excess of 70,000 pints of blood to supply the nine local member hospitals. Anyone 17 years and older, in good health, and weighing 110 pounds is eligible to donate blood. **Questions:** Call Jeanie Bentzel, 766-3526. Each pint of blood can help up to three people. Remember that there is no substitute for human blood, people are the only source.
