Concert Series Presents Dr. Joyce Jones

Trinity's Concert Series will present concert organist Dr. Joyce Jones on Sunday afternoon, March 26, at 4:00 p.m. Dr. Jones is professor of organ and artist-in-residence at Baylor University in Waco, Texas. A portion of the concert will feature our Chancel Choir, under the direction of Timothy Koch, singing *Solemn Mass* by the late Louis Vierne - former organist of the famed Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris. In commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the birth of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Dr. Jones will play "Fantasy" - one of the few pieces Mozart wrote for the organ.

During the Sunday School hour that morning, Dr. Jones will present a program and "hands-on" demonstration to our K-5th graders using our 75-rank nave organ. Critics have joined with audiences in praise and appreciation to Joyce Jones for sharing the magnificence of the "King of Instruments" with children and audiences around the world.

When Joyce Jones plays a pedal solo, it is her way of thanking God for showing her what she was to do with her life. As a piano major in college, she sprained her hand so badly that she was unable to play for many weeks. During that time, she turned to the organ and from that developed into one of today's leading concert organists.

As one of the first artists to take classical organ music to small communities, Joyce Jones has also been lauded for her impeccable technique, beautiful expression, perfect rhythm and audience rapport - termed "a friendliness that completely entranced her audience."

Dr. Jones has devoted her professional life to making friends for the organ through community concerts, organ dedications, etc. She has played in 44 states and 12 foreign countries. She earned the Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Texas, and has recorded for Word, Rosenhaus, and Motette Records. She is a Fellow of the American Guild of Organists and has performed recitals at such venues as the Crystal Cathedral, Mormon Tabernacle, and Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris.

Dr. Jones is well-known for her encores of "The Flight of the Bumble Bee" - played only on the pedals! All concerts are free. Come and bring your friends.



Artist of the Month

Polly McCann, Artist of the Month for March says one of her earliest memories is the spiced aroma of the art classrooms for children at the Kansas City Nelson Atkins' Museum of Art. She began taking art lessons very early in life and continued until she began teaching private drawing and painting out of her home studio in 2001.

Polly received her BA in Studio Art from Messiah College with a concentration in oil painting. Much of her work is based on collage: layered paper and paint using fine art techniques and found objects. Some of these paintings are vibrant abstract images while other pieces tell a story.

Much of Polly's work is inspired by her faith journey, her observations of nature, or research of history. Polly says she hopes her work creates a spark of recognition with each viewer. "It is my goal to provide images that give people vision, a hope and a future." She is just beginning to write and illustrate children's books. Her website is:

Staff Notes

What a day!

It had been one of those days. A series of events occurred, making my husband's workday challenging, to say the least. He'd missed the bus, which came unusually early. It was a cold, brutal day that sliced through the body. Office equipment didn't work the way it was supposed to. His lunch-time hoagie gave him indigestion. The boss was in the hospital, and couldn't be contacted on things. The final indignity was when Randy caught his new winter parka on a sharp metal edge, ripping a big hole in the coat's arm.

Randy called me from work, saying, "It's been a terrible, horrible, no good, very bad day." (Those of us with children might recognize these words from Judith Viorst's humorous children's story *Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day*.) If you've read the book, you might also understand why Randy added the declarative, "I think I'll move to Australia."

Sometimes we have those days. Days when everything goes wrong, and we seem to have absolutely no control. Or, days when everything goes wrong, and part of the problem is we're way too controlling!

When we have these terrible, horrible, no good, very bad days, we are indeed tempted to move to Australia. If that isn't possible, we're willing to resort to burrowing under our blankets, watching a mindless sit com, and eating a carton of *Ben and Jerry's*. It won't change what happened, but for a little while we live in the bliss of ignoring, denying, and possibly even forgetting what happened.

The church season of Lent begins with a dramatic declarative of its own: You and I cannot move to Australia. We can try to ignore, deny or forget what has happened in our lives, but, at some point, even that will stop working. On Ash Wednesday, the realization comes through loud and clear that we are mortal, sinful, imperfect human beings. God knows it. We know it. And on Ash Wednesday we confess it.

On his way home from work that day, Randy stopped at a fabric store and bought a patch to cover the hole in his coat. It did the job—the hole can no longer be seen. But since the patch has a slight sheen to it, and the sleeve it is bonded to is a flat black color, you can still see the **patch**. Randy and I will always know the hole is still there.

So you might wonder how God will ever patch **us** up. Well, as you and I journey through Lent, we are going to hear the story of our Lord Jesus. Jesus will go to the cross to die for us, and then be raised to new life. Not as a patch to cover the holes in our lives, no. Not as a patch that merely reminds us our holes still exist, our flaws just under the surface. Instead, Jesus goes to the cross to make us entirely new, head to toe, inside and out. We plead in Psalm 51 that God might be merciful and make us white as snow. Well, he promises to do just that through Christ, shaping us continually by his Spirit into his Son's lovely image.

And he also promises his enduring presence with us, even on those horrible, terrible, no good, very bad days. Knowing that, we can journey on.

Housing Needed for October Concert

On Monday evening, October 30, 2006, Trinity will be presenting a concert of major musical and logistical proportions - the 150-member Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus from Kiev, Ukraine. We will be the last stop on their East Coast tour before they return home. Housing will be needed for the performers on Monday night following the concert. They would need a bed, a shower, and a light breakfast and ride to the church on Tuesday morning. Even though it's eight months away - it's not too soon to think about becoming a "host family." Those for whom we cannot find houses will be put up in an area hotel *at our expense*.

Realizing that music has a profound effect on the hearts of people, the Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus proclaims the love of Christ and truths of Scripture through great Christian classics in its concerts.

The group began in 1992 when American choral conductor Dr. Roger McMurrin and his wife Diane were invited by an Episcopal priest to come to Kiev to perform Handel's *Messiah*. Roger hired 35 Ukrainian professional singers and a local orchestra to premier this work, which had been prohibited by the Communists for seventy years. The concert hall was overflowing with people that night, and the souls of the enthusiastic audience were touched by a glimpse of God's glory. This left a lasting impression on the McMurrins and shortly afterwards they felt the call to leave their life in America, and move to this former Soviet country to continue their ministry to the people of Ukraine.

The Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus has premiered over 53 Christian classics, many of which have been aired on radio and television across Ukraine. On six tours of the United States, the KSOC has introduced Americans to Ukraine and the extensive ministries of Music Mission Kiev (musicmissionkiev.org).

The KSOC has given the Ukrainian people the chance to hear great choral masterpieces for the first time - particularly those based on religious themes - which in Soviet days were banned. In addition to great music, hear testimonies of religious persecution behind the Iron Curtain and how so many have embraced Christianity through this ministry.
