HYMN FESTIVAL TO BE PRESENTED IN APRIL

Trinity and the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Guild of Organists will co-sponsor a Hymn Festival as part of our concert series to be held here on Sunday evening, April 23 at 7:00 p.m. Lead by organist, composer and conductor Dr. David Cherwien, the Festival will highlight the innovative merging of organ, instruments and voices. A 150-voice Festival Choir of adults and children from many area churches will participate. Representing Trinity will be our Matins Choir girls, and the Crusade, Carol and Chancel Choirs.

David Cherwien serves as Cantor at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, MN and is director of the National Lutheran Choir, also based in the Twin Cities. He completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance, and the Master of Arts degree in Theory and Composition, both from the University of Minnesota. Following his undergraduate work he studied for two years at the Berlin Church Music School in Berlin, Germany.

He is composer of the popular series for organ, *Interpretations*, based on hymn tunes and has published other liturgical music for choir and organ. He is author of the book *Let the People Sing*, a practical guide for those who lead congregational song. He and the National Lutheran Choir have recorded several CD's, the most recent being *Hymns We Long to Sing*, released in May of 2005. The concert is free, and an offering will be taken to defray expenses.

STAFF NOTES -- "RETRACE THE STEPS"

"Now, what did I come downstairs for? I know I wanted something from the pantry, but what was it?" I stand in front of my shelves of canned good and staples, racking my brain over the item needed.

Brain-racking is to no avail. I finally admit defeat and memory loss, and head back upstairs. I retrace my steps to the kitchen, where I promptly recall the item I wanted. Then back downstairs I go.

The retracing of my footsteps always helps me. That's the same technique I recommend to my children when they seem to have lost or misplaced something. I bite my tongue to refrain from saying that the glove-book-ball-shoe (whatever the object happens to be) didn't just walk away! Instead, I suggest wisely (as only a mother can) that they simply retrace their steps, go back to where they last saw the object or played with the object or wore the object. The retracing of their footsteps usually (not always) helps them find that which was lost.

Sunday, April 9, is the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday. This special day opens up Holy Week for many Christians the world over (our Orthodox Christian friends will observe Passion Sunday one week later). In worship that day we will retrace the steps our Lord Jesus took in Jerusalem as he moved toward the cross to die. Our worship opens up with fanfare and the celebratory mood of those who lined the Jerusalem streets to greet Jesus. But then, we will be led into the solemn contemplation of Jesus' last supper with the disciples, his lonely hours of prayer, his betrayal and arrest, his trial, crucifixion and death. Throughout Holy Week, we have daily worship opportunities here at Trinity to remember Jesus and the journey he took in obedience to his heavenly Father and out of love for us.

Surely these were hard steps to walk. Yet, because Jesus "walks this lonesome valley," as the spiritual goes, he makes it possible to recover that which was lost—the people God created. He goes to the lengths of life and death to find you and me, no matter how far we have strayed, that he may take away our sins, put an end to the sting of death, and bring us at last into his kingdom.

As we approach this holiest of weeks in our church year, may our retracing the steps of our savior be a blessing for our days, a source of strength and renewal for our faith, and lead us evermore to praise and glorify the almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Greetings to all in the name of the Lord. March was our BIGGEST & BUSIEST month of the year. With our YG (youth group) calendar fuller than ever, there is no rest for the weary. Our YG calendar is so jam-packed with stuff for everyone. There is something YG related on every weekend. If it's not a large group meeting, it's a small group meeting. There are plenty of meetings, events, retreats, sleepovers, and various get-togethers for everybody. Here is a look at what we did in the month of February.

We started the month of February with our SOUPER BOWL SUNDAY service project during all of the church services on the 5th. We were able to raise over \$1000 dollars to aid the Allison Hill Community Food Bank in Harrisburg. This helps them a lot with much more than food. They are able to get the kids clothes, gifts, additional programs and classes. It's a great service. On Sunday the 12th we had a YG MEETING from 6-9 p.m. Around 50 YG plus advisors turned out for the night. The topic was NEVER GIVE UP and we looked at people who never gave up when faced with adversity. We discussed, watched a video, and did some exercises related to this. Helpers came out for the night of total fun. We played games, ate pizza, watched movies, enjoyed fellowship, and had one fabulous game of indoor soccer. It was probably the BEST JR. HIGH SLEEPOVER ever! On Sunday the 26th we had two YG events. First off, 11 SR./JR. Leaders and three advisors went over to help out at Zion Lutheran Church in downtown Harrisburg. We were called into service to clean up after the month long homeless shelter was set up there. The kids, advisors and I cleaned all of the mattresses that the homeless slept on and then stacked them back up for the next shelter. It was a meaningful and needed service which I'm glad we could provide to them. It served as a good teaching agent for our SR./JR. Leaders as well. Later on that evening we had a YG MEETING from 6-9 p.m. Around 50 YG plus advisors turned out for the night. The topic was BEING A SERVANT (fitting isn't it?). We looked at ways that we serve as individuals and looked to Christ's ultimate example of service to us. The night was quite powerful and much faith, fun and fellowship was had by all. Well, that was the month of February, and we did a lot.

Before I go for this month I do have some additional news for you. We are finally starting to get all of our details for this summer's ELCA NATIONAL YOUTH GATHERING IN SAN ANTONIO. We have 24 Sr. High youth and four advisors going on this trip. It has

been a long and hard process but the final pieces are being put in place. The hardest part was getting the plane tickets, which we now have. We've been working with a travel agent (sometimes three) since last year to make this happen. Among other factors, ticket prices are insane and there is a lot of price gouging going on for everyone going. Our tickets are over double the cost, per ticket, we had planned. But we had to do what we had to do. Our hotel is nice and right beside the ALAMO. All and all, early frustrations aside, I can't wait for the trip, it should be awesome! That's all for now. I'll keep you posted.

DO YOU KNOW: The Guild is responsible for the paraments, washes and irons the linens, checks the albs worn by the pastors and acolytes for cleaning and pressing but, most importantly, does all the preparations for communion. Trinity has rail communion the first Sunday of the month at 8:15 a.m. and the third Sunday of the month at 11:00 a.m. Plus there is communion by intinction at every other service; so there is involvement at every service by the Guild members. It takes three or four people to wash all the chalices that are used. Also all the candles must be refilled with oil each week.

There is a chairperson for each month and they have six to eight people to call upon for all the work needed during that month. They also prepare the flowers for delivery. Many of the women have been doing this service for 20-30 years and an amazing number are in their 80's. You need strength to lift those large candle sticks off the altar to put on fresh linen (wine does get spilled). So Barbara and Ruth could use some younger, stronger women, and men would be a great help also.

Marla Peters says "as part of the Worship Committee for many years I have enjoyed the opportunity of being Decorating Coordinator for Christmas, Easter and Pentecost." Leslie Kemper, a fairly new member, has graciously accepted this position and Marla is presently training her for the Easter Preparations.
