Artists of the Month **Third Street Gallery**

Third Street Gallery specializes in local artists only, who work in all types of media and styles. There are classes in watercolor, oil, pastel, portrait drawing, faux painting, children's art and home school art as well as special workshops in watercolor, figure sculpture, Pysanky egg painting, embroidery and lace making.

Cynthia Hobaugh Orwan was raised in New Cumberland, graduated from Cedar Cliff High School, and received a Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degrees with a minor in art from Shippensburg University. She studied watercolor locally with David Lenker and Barbara Buer and taught classes at the *Art School and Galleries* in Mechanicsburg. In 2000 she and her late husband Bob opened *Artistic Collectibles/Third Street Gallery* in New Cumberland where she now teaches and shows her work. Numerous local galleries, private offices and homes display her work.

A native of Wilkes-Barre, Don Brandt attended Wilkes College where he studied art history, design and composition, and drawing and painting in different mediums at the *Murray School of Art*. He

also studied under master artists in Wilkes-Barre and Harrisburg. His paintings, sculpture, and drawings have been selected and exhibited in juried art shows and private and corporate collections. A 34-year member of the renowned *Seven Lively Artists* and a former member of the *Art Association of Harrisburg* Board of Directors, Don divides his painting time between Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and Maine. Don is currently teaching oil and acrylic classes at the *Third Street Gallery* and the *Art Center School and Galleries* where he has been a member and guest instructor for 25 years.

Annette Braugh specializes in pastel, watercolor, and oils. Painting since the early 1970s, she is self-taught but has studied with several local artists. She feels that she can learn and grow through her painting and believes it is important to see and feel the subject matter she paints. Being able to play the light and shadows makes a painting come alive. She loves to travel and her paintings are usually inspired from the photographs she takes locally and abroad in places such as Iceland, Costa Rica, Australia, New Zealand, Germany, and England. Her artwork typically portrays landscapes and points of interest. She has conducted workshops, taught pastels, and shown work in several galleries.

Staff Notes Under Construction

Every few months I drive up to northwestern Pennsylvania to visit my parents in the town of my childhood—Ridgway. The highways I travel (particularly 22/322) have been under construction for awhile now. The Lewistown Narrows, the “Missing Link” near Milroy, and the roads through and around Port Matilda have seen PennDOT activity for years. So if someone asks me how many miles I drive to get to Ridgway, I say, “It depends.” Sometimes it’s 165 miles, another time it may be 171 for the road is constantly being altered. There might be a detour onto a secondary roadway as PennDOT crews blast through yet another mountain, or suddenly I find myself on a new stretch of highway I’ve never seen before. I remember last year how pleased I was that I didn’t have to do all that “stop and go” driving through the town of Philipsburg, but instead was re-routed around it. The mountain scenery was beautiful and I made much better time to boot. Now I look forward to my 170-odd mile trip because there is always something novel about the journey. The road is slowly being shaped and formed in new ways. I still reach the same destination, but the journey itself is ever changing.

That’s a good image for the journey we are on as Christians. The destination remains the same—to live in God’s kingdom. To live under the gracious, holy rule of God in this life and in the life to come. But we ought to recognize that the road we travel is always changing, always being shaped and reconstructed in new ways as we stretch and grow in faith. Sometimes the changes seem almost imperceptible. We read a story in scripture or a brief Christian devotion, we gather for worship and prayer, or we enter into conversations about faith and life with others, and we gain a bit of new insight into what it means to be children of God. That insight (and the reflection that brought us to that insight) may be very small indeed, but nevertheless we suddenly find ourselves on a bit of new highway as we follow Christ.

Sometimes, though, it is as if dynamite has blasted through the mountains of our journey. Life-altering events (both positive and negative) require

us to detour, back-track, and use up a lot more “gasoline” than we ever intended. (That’s energy and time, folks.) Living under the gracious, holy rule of God seems difficult, if not impossible, and we may begin to doubt we will ever reach our destination. For one thing, we may be afraid to go on unfamiliar roads. (It’s risky to love like Christ, because you never know where that might take you.) Or we may struggle just trying to read the map. (What would you have me do, God? Where are you calling me? What gifts of the Spirit have you given me?) We may become impatient during the journey. (Aren’t we there yet? Can’t we go a little faster?)

Writer Frederick Buechner once wrote that faith is “a journey without maps.” I like that phrase. To me, it means God intends for us to travel new patches of highway all the time. He intends for us to learn and grow. He even intends for us to enjoy the scenery along the way. But his greatest intention is this—that we will trust He is at work “reconstructing” us, and will bring us at last to the place we can truly call home.

On Eagle's Wings *Summer Bible School*

SMILE See Me In Love Everyday! was the theme of Summer Bible School in the Northwest Territories for *On Eagle's Wings*. More children, more communities than ever before! Three members of Trinity went north to two communities. I went to Normal Wells with AnnE Zimmerman, Director of Ministry for OEW. We had many wonderful helpers and they were so pleased their community was included! There are always more communities that want us than we can accommodate because we do not have enough volunteer teachers.

The following week Mary Kichman and her teenage daughter Hannah joined me in Deline on Great Bear Lake. This village of 600 was also very happy we could include them for the first time. We had 30-35 smiling children join us each afternoon for three hours to act out Bible stories, sing new songs, play games, do craft projects, and have snacks. Again, the community was very supportive of our presence. OEW is an ecumenical Christian outreach program to children. The children are delightful but their parents and grandparents have many concerns for their futures. These villages are remote; there are no roads (only in winter when they have the ice roads). But they do have TV and computers. In their culture children do not go out into the world "to seek their fortune." Families stay together!! For thousands of years they have lived this way. The village of Deline has only existed from the 1960s; the people lived on the land and followed the caribou. The parents believe their children need a strong faith to face their futures. That is why they have asked *On Eagle's Wings* to come.

Mary, Hannah, and I believe we received more than we were able to give. The children are very loving and made us promise to return. It is a very valuable mission for Trinity to support. Trinity has a continuing presence on the board of OEW. I have replaced Bill "Bucky" Walters and I will be attending the fall board meeting in Edmonton, Alberta in October.

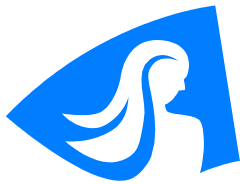

Becoming Women of Purpose
