STAFF NOTES

A Walk in the Cemetery

In the town where I served my first congregation—Duncannon—there was a cemetery on the hill above the church. My husband Randy and I enjoyed taking daily walks together there in the peace and quiet. Parishioners would often see us going up and down the gentle rises, weaving our way on the various paths until we'd managed our two-mile-or-so walk. When we moved to New

Bloomfield, there was another cemetery, though because the terrain was fairly level, our exercise wasn't quite so aerobic.

I've always liked walking in cemeteries (well, in the daytime, at least). Even in the town where I attended college—Greenville, PA—there was a large cemetery just past my Alma Mater. Classmates and I, when skipping an occasional Renaissance Art History Class (it was at 1:00 p.m., and I'd only fall asleep anyway), would linger on the cemetery paths, reading various headstones from years earlier. It made for interesting reading. We chuckled at the name "Loveless" on one gravestone, although we realized that by the flowers so well tended, and the other inscriptions on the stone, this person was certainly loved and remembered by their family.

I hungered to know the histories of folks long buried. In the cemetery up above my church in Duncannon, there was a headstone for "Socrates Green." I like the sound of that name, don't you? And don't you wonder who Socrates Green was? What rich experiences of life did he have?

Sometimes on these cemetery walks, I would see recently-dug graves and the remains of flowers from the funeral turning brown upon the brown dirt. Some of the people buried in these graves I knew—people I was graced by God to know, and I grieved their passing. Taking a walk in the cemetery would make me consider the passing of time and the passing of generations.

Perhaps it seems like mixing apples and oranges here, but I also saw my fair share of babies in strollers while walking in the cemetery. In fact, in New Bloomfield, Randy and I often walked with our Sarah and Matthew in the double stroller (this was pre-Rebecca). Then again, it makes perfect sense to reflect on cemeteries and babies simultaneously. What images to bring together as we consider the cycle of life, and the sheer gift of being part of God's creation. Past and present and future are bound together by Him. Our ancestors shared the story of God's mighty acts with us. We in turn share that same story with our children. As the Psalmist sang, "Every day I will bless you, and praise your name forever and ever. Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised, and his greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts. . . . Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures throughout all generations." (Psalm 145:2-3, 13)

If we truly believe in the "communion of saints," as we confess in the Apostles' Creed each week in worship, then we know we are linked to those generations who have gone before us, and those who will come after us. We join with all God's people in every time and place in praise of Him who will, at the last, bring time and history to an end, and establish an everlasting kingdom of peace, of *shalom*.

And thus, the passing of time is not so much something to grieve as it is something to look upon with awe. Cemeteries and babies fill me with that kind of awe.

CRHP is a concentrated commitment in time, study and self-discovery. It is profound enough that one of my sisters is going into the ministry; another has redirected her faltering spirituality, and the third found strength to battle past weaknesses.

We all have been touched by faith expressed on its most intimate terms of the soul level. You can be re-awakened too, by joining the CRHP 4 class now. It is pure joy!

ARTIST OF THE MONTH BARBARA PASSERI WARFEL

Barbara Passeri Warfel has earned a reputation for excellence as an artist and instructor of oil painting and drawing in south central Pennsylvania, particularly in the area of portraiture. Her portraits and still life work are widely displayed, winning awards and honors, including: "Best of Show" at the Art Association of Harrisburg. Her portrait "Danielle" was chosen for display at the Governor's Mansion. She also enjoys drawing and painting flowers from her garden as well as still life arrangements. She participated as a designer in the 2006 Harrisburg Symphony Society Designer Showhouse, creating an artist's bedroom/garret on the third floor. In October she was honored by receiving Jump Street's SPECTRUM Award for Excellence in the Arts and will be featured in *Harrisburg Magazine's* December issue.

Barbara holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in art education from Rowan University and completed graduate study in advanced drawing at the University of Hartford. She has received instruction in oil painting from Li Hidley and John Whitney. In 1990 she began teaching adults in painting and oil portraiture for the Art Association of Harrisburg, as well as the Arts Center School and Gallery in Mechanicsburg.

Sharing what she has learned throughout her artistic life is a great joy. In 1998 she designed and implemented an arts program especially for senior adults residing in assisted living facilities and does art therapy with Alzheimer's patients in an assisted living setting and in adult daycare.

Barbara offers seminars in drawing at the Art Center School and Galleries called "The Quiet Eye". The seminar is designed to develop an individual's drawing expertise and is for beginners as well as those trying to improve their skills.

YOUR LIBRARY

DID YOU KNOW: The church library is open for browsing and use whenever the building is open? Assistance is available on Wednesday mornings.

I use the library quite a bit; to borrow books, check on references and sometimes just to spend some quiet time there. If you have never visited our library to look through all the materials stored there you are in for a wonderful surprise.

Our library has many materials, from Bibles to books on U.S. and world history and geography. Some other selections are devotions, inspiration, meditation, prayer, Christian living, drama, poetry, aging, youth and social issues, arts and crafts, church music and hymnals. There is also a children's section, and LARGE print books along with many video and audio tapes.

For the benefit of all who use the library I am listing the rules/guidelines so that everyone is able to enjoy maximum use of all of the materials.

1. Books may be borrowed from the library at any time. Reference works have special markings on the spine of the book and should not be removed from the library without checking with the librarian.
2. When borrowing any material, please sign the card in the pocket at the back of the book.
3. Books should not be borrowed for more than 4 weeks. This is a very generous time period. If needed for a longer period, please check with the librarian. If no one has requested the material, which is usually the case, you may renew the book(s).
4. Returned books should be placed in the desk drawer in the library so that they can be processed and replaced on the shelves by the library volunteers.
5. It is expected that lost or badly damaged books will be replaced by the borrower.
6. Audio tapes of services and Thursday Bible study are also available in the library. They are located above the card file. As with books, please make sure you sign on the sheet placed above the tapes. List the date of the service or Bible study, date picked up and return date of the tape.
7. Library staff will be on duty Wednesday morning, 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. and assistance is available at this time. **Betty Lou Waldner** is our librarian.
8. Should you have any questions or a need for any book not in the library, please advise Betty Lou so that consideration can be given to obtaining it in the future.
