Odin Rathnam and Romulo Benavides In Concert at Trinity

Trinity's 2006/2007 Concert Series continues on Sunday afternoon, March 25 at 4:00 p.m. with a concert by two virtuoso violinists: Odin Rathnam and Romulo Benavides. Truly two of America's finest string players - the duo will play several works including the beautiful Prokofiev Sonata for Two Violins.

Since his critically acclaimed Lincoln Center debut in 1993, Odin Rathnam has established himself as one of the most versatile artists of his generation. Praised by critics for his "captivating temperament," "brilliant technique" and "innate musicianship," Rathnam has performed at major European and American festivals. He has also appeared in recital at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall and Carnegie Recital Hall, where he first appeared at the age of 15. As a soloist, he has performed with the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, the New Amsterdam Symphony, the Camden and Hayes Orchestras in England to name a few.

Each summer Rathnam returns as a performing faculty member to string festivals in Denmark, where he has taught for 15 years, collaborating in concert with many leading soloists and European orchestral string principals.

He has performed extensively on American and European radio and television, including the major classical stations of New York, Washington and Harrisburg as well as coast to coast broadcasts on National Public Radio's Performance Today and CBS's 60 Minutes.

Mr. Rathnam received his formal training at Mannes College of Music and at the Juilliard School in New York City. Central Pennsylvania audiences will recognize him as the concertmaster of the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra.



Romulo Benavides, a young Venezuelan violinist, studied in Caracas, Venezuela and later at The Juilliard School. At Brooklyn College, where he worked towards a Master's Degree, Benavides studied with the famed Itzhak Perlman. Mr. Benavides is the 1st prize winner of the Juan Bautista Plaza violin competition held in Caracas, Venezuela

where he performed as soloist with the Simon Bolivar Symphony and the Venezuelan Symphony Orchestra. His performances also include concerts on Venezuelan



National Television and Radio. In the United States, Benavides has performed at the Aspen Music Festival as well as in other important venues such as Carnegie Hall and the Alice Tully Hall of Lincoln Center.

Mr. Benavides is the recipient of many awards and scholarships from many prestigious institutions, such as the Aspen School of Music. As a chamber musician, he performs with the Caracas Virtuosi and toured Europe, North America and Latin America. Mr. Benavides performs regularly with ensembles devoted to Latin American music of the 20th century, such as the Carpentier Quartet and the Ensemble America of which Mr. Benavides is a founding member.

During the past two years, he has served as concertmaster for the Philadelphia Virtuosi Orchestra - leading this ensemble in a recording for World Records. He is also a tango enthusiast and keeps a regular performance schedule with various ensembles in New York City such as the Tango Porteno with pianist Mauricio Najt and the Frank Valiente Quintet with whom he has recorded on repeated occasions. Mr. Benavides is a faculty member of the Long Island Conservatory.

Trinity's Way of the Cross

The Way of the Cross is a spiritual reflection on Christ's last journey as he walked to his death on a cross at Calvary as atonement for our sins. This spiritual reflection takes many forms, from actually walking Christ's route along the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem with stops at the fourteen stations traditionally ascribed to the Way of the Cross (visit www.holylandnetwork.com/jerusalem/via_dolorosa/via_dolorosa.htm) to Lenten devotionals based on the Way of the Cross.

This year during Holy Week you will be able to take your own spiritual journey along the Way of the Cross here at Trinity. The physical journey will be short - it will be totally confined to Fellowship Hall - but the spiritual journey may be long and intense for you. You will be able to take the journey virtually anytime that the building is open from Sunday evening on the Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday (April 1) through the evening of Good Friday (April 6). While others may be taking the physical journey with you as you walk from station to station, the spiritual journey is one that you will take alone, but not really alone for the Holy Spirit will be with you in your journey.

The journey will start when you pick up the devotional booklet (written by Trinity's Director of Learning Ministries, Christopher Couch) that will guide you through the fourteen stations. For each of the fourteen stations, the booklet includes scripture passages, a devotional reflection and prayer that focus on the events that occurred at that station in Jesus' final journey. At each station, there will be a work of art that is the artist's reflection on the events of that station. Fourteen Trinity artists who work in a wide variety of media were asked to contribute works of art for the stations. Each artist was simply given the scripture references, devotional reflection and prayer for their assigned station. The resulting work is the artist's Spirit-led reflection on the events of that station. It may be a depiction of the physical events, or the emotional reaction to the events or the spiritual response to the events. It may be a response to the overall events of that station, or to a single word that has particular meaning to the artist. The portrayal may be very realistic or very abstract. But each of the works will help you in your reflection of Christ's final walk to his crucifixion.

Traditionally, the Way of the Cross begins with Christ's condemnation by Pontius Pilate. Trinity's Way of the Cross will begin a few hours earlier with Christ and his disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane and ends with Christ being laid in the tomb. The fourteen stations that you will visit in your journey through Trinity's Way of the Cross are:

1. Jesus in the Garden – a work in oil by Jane Eichenberger
2. The arrest of Jesus – a work in wood by Roger Smith
3. The trial of Jesus before the priests and teachers of the law – a work in fabric by Cathy Nye
4. Condemnation from the High Priest Caiaphas – a work in photography by Bill Bishop
5. Pilate with Jesus – a work in watercolor by Craig Staller
6. The guards beat Jesus – a work in music by Debbie Wilson
7. Jesus taken to Golgotha – a work in stained glass by Carolyn Jones
8. Jesus speaks on the way to the cross – a painting by Mary Kay Fager
9. Jesus is crucified – a work in clay by Patty Marshall
10. It is dark – a work in photography by Paul Gnazzo
11. Jesus speaks on the cross – a work in found art by Christopher Couch
12. Jesus dies – a painting by Barbara Catlin
13. Jesus is entombed – a quilt by Becky Enney
14. The body in the tomb – a work by Devin Ackerman

Come join Jesus on this journey along Trinity's Way of the Cross.

So Great a Cloud of Witnesses

In January, the wife of my childhood pastor died. Carol Decker had been suffering from Alzheimer's for nearly a decade. That explained her confusion and anxiety when I greeted her at a seminary event in 1999. Already she had begun to see memories and knowledge fade into some kind of gray mist.

My mother told me that Pastor Decker had tenderly cared for his wife these last several years. I'm not surprised. Their partnership, forged in God's blessing of their union, persisted through years of parish ministry, parenting issues, and retirement activities. He had merely given back to her the kind of devotion she had always given him.

Carol was quiet and shy, which could have made it difficult for her to be a clergy spouse. The expectations parishioners often had for the (usually) female spouse of the pastor were somewhat unrealistic back in the '60's and '70's. I'm grateful such expectations do not burden my spouse in this new millennium. Whether they burdened Carol, I do not know. What I do remember is that she, in her quiet but resolute way, brought the presence of Christ into our parish.

Whether it was singing in the choir or helping the youth group with a project, Carol was there. She wasn't the soloist, she wasn't the one in charge, but you could count on her to be there. We'll always have Christians who talk a great story about their faith walk. She just walked it.

Carol was also my mother's friend. They made banners together—banners that hung near the chancel, and changed by the church season. The banners were pieced together late into the evenings, after Carol and my mother had finished their housework. Some friendships develop over a latte at Starbucks. Carol and my mother became friends over felt and scissors and Elmer's glue, and a vision of what each banner should proclaim. My favorite banner was the one that hung throughout the Easter season. On it were the words "He is Risen!" Underneath those words, white lilies bloomed on a lavender background. A simple banner, really, but with the truth about the living God that Christians have proclaimed since angels arrayed in white first declared it to the women who approached the empty tomb.

In Hebrews 12, we read ". . . since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith . . ." Carol Decker was one of those witnesses for me and my family. She ran her race with perseverance, always looking to Jesus. I give thanks to God for Carol, and the many Christian witnesses—often quiet and unassuming—whom you and I meet in our lives. For they show us how to walk the walk of faith.

Having recently become aware of her innate talent in this area, Akeelah fantasizes about the prospect of being a star of the bee circuit. The tragic problem -- intelligence of this kind is not valued in her community, where skills of athleticism and rapping are coveted far more than school smarts. Though Akeelah attempts to hide her academic acuity behind a rebellious attitude, she can't resist the temptation to enter her school's spelling bee. Akeelah is a warm, family-friendly underdog story - Keke Palmer's performance as Akeelah delivers on the script's promise, with terrific supporting performances from Laurence Fishburne and Angela Bassett. Akeelah has a PG rating, an 83% rating from critics on the Rotten Tomatoes review site, a Christian Science Monitor "B" rating, and runs 1 hr. 52 min. Volunteers Needed For Homeless Shelter In March

The 2006/2007 Harrisburg Winter Homeless Shelter is open until the end of March. Members of Trinity will be hosting the shelter on selected nights from March 16 through March 31 at Zion Lutheran Church on 4th Street in Harrisburg.

Each evening a team of four volunteers (male and female) arrive at Zion at 8:45 p.m. We make coffee and have a snack ready for the guests when they come in after 9:00 p.m. A staff person from HELP screens each guest and approves their entry into the shelter. Lights are turned out at 10:00 p.m. The four volunteers may take turns napping/resting overnight, but one volunteer should stay alert to any needs of the guests. At 6:00 a.m. the volunteers make coffee and begin to turn on the lights to waken the guests. By 7:00 a.m. the guests have left and the volunteer duties are completed.

The Sacrament of Communion, A Family Matter

Dear Parents:

Over three Sundays in January, we offered learning opportunities for our children in the rotation program (kindergarten through fifth grade) regarding the sacrament of Communion. This is the first time we moved learning about Communion from Saturday workshops to the Sunday Church School, and we're planning on keeping this arrangement. From now on, learning about Communion will be a regular part of the SCS program.

The classes were taught by our pastors, vicar, and lay teachers. Each child, who came for the three weeks to learn about Communion received three sessions, each giving a different perspective with all sessions presenting a unified message about the sacrament.

At Trinity, each Communicant (of any age) must be baptized, and families decide when a child may first commune. No workshop or class is required regarding the time of first Communion—it is simply the family's decision. However, we appreciate the need to have these decisions made in a clear and informed way, which is why we will be offering the classes regularly.

You don't have to wait for the classes if you would like your child—or yourselves—to be more fully informed about the sacrament. There is a home-help for families to learn about Communion together. This help, entitled *A Place for You: My Holy Communion Book*, will be available in the rotation classroom area, most likely in or near Bibleland (Room 122).

In addition, our pastors, vicar, and I will be available to talk with anyone about Communion and children receiving Communion. Please contact any of us to arrange a time. The church will arrange for baptism, too, for potential Communicants of any age.

The church can also provide a First Communion Certificate, if that is desired. This isn't necessary, though often a physical, touchable reminder of an important event is a good thing to have. Simply contact the church office with the name of the child and the date of her/his first Communion. We'll complete the certificate and have it available for you.

Again, keep in mind that the only requirements for first Communion for children are to be baptized and to have the family decide when. Baptism is required for all Communicants.

In summary Communion really is a family matter. For the children, it's a family decision; and for our church, it's a family sharing, when we all gather as the Family of God to receive the sacrament.

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Prayer Shawl Ministry

From that seed our own Prayer Shawl Ministry group started meeting in the fall of 2004 with several women getting together to knit and crochet prayer shawls for members of our church as well as friends and their own families. The membership of the Prayer Shawl Ministry varies and some Monday's (we meet the fourth Monday of the month in the church library from 7-8 p.m.) we have four ladies knitting and sharing each other's fellowship and some Mondays we have as many as ten women sitting around the library table knitting away. The group helps each other with knitting techniques and pattern ideas but the main focus of the group is to knit prayer shawls with love in each stitch for those who need comfort. Since the group began in 2004, over 85 prayer shawls have been knit and given to church members and others by the group or through the pastor's visitations.

size 11 or 13 knitting needles! We have some yarn but we are asking for donations. Over 85 prayer shawls made that are keeping someone warm with the love of Christ. Not a bad way to spend your evening ... knitting with friends for someone else who you may never meet but where your love and caring will be felt forever.
