The word "requiem" usually refers to the Roman Catholic Mass for the Dead, which begins with the Latin phrase "Requiem aeternam dona eis domine" ("Grant them eternal rest, O Lord"). Settings of the Latin Requiem text were liturgical works for the Catholic service, intended for use in a service of prayer for the soul of the deceased. Brahms conceived the extraordinary idea of creating his own text, selecting Biblical passages that do not correspond to the funeral liturgy of any church, but that nonetheless represent a deeply felt response to the central problem of human existence. To distinguish his work from the Catholic Mass for the Dead, he called it Ein deutsches Requiem ("A German Requiem").

STAFF NOTES

A Meaningful Life

A relative of mine, browsing through a bookstore, found a book she thought I would like. Prayers of Our Presidents, it was entitled. In reality, most of the examples of presidential "prayers" were speeches addressed to the electorate or the Congress. And not all the presidents were represented. Once again, the lone Pennsylvanian (President James Buchanan) was not among those quoted. Then again, he rarely is.

However, several presidents' prayers or speeches included in the book were eloquent and deserving of our further reflection. I especially appreciated words from President Jimmy Carter. At his Inaugural on January 20, 1977, he said, "I would like to have my frequent prayer answered that God let my life be meaningful in the enhancement of His kingdom and that my life might be meaningful in the enhancement of the lives of my fellow human beings."

That's a bold, clear statement about the meaning of a human's existence. Usually, we become confused about what makes life "meaningful." All too often, we are influenced by the proclamations of our culture, rather than the proclamation of our Lord. "Meaning" for our lives, says the world, comes by way of the amount of things we possess and the status we accrue. Virtually every ad targeting us comes with that very premise underlying it—that self-fulfillment, that making one's self content, brings us "meaning."

President Carter prayed that his life would both enhance the kingdom and enhance the lives of his brothers and sisters. Note this is no prayer asking for God to meet our own particular needs, make us content, and promote our self-fulfillment. Quite the contrary. Carter is asking to be used for fulfilling God's holy purposes. Carter's words resonate not with our culture, but with the sound of our Lord's own words about the two greatest commandments: Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength; and love your neighbor as yourself. (Luke 10:27). Yes, a daily routine consisting of loving God and loving our neighbors would indeed make our life meaningful.

In this season of Easter we celebrate that the One who came to serve and die now lives. Jesus' life and death were meaningful beyond all measure because they enhanced his Father's kingdom and the lives of every human being—his brothers and sisters. May we live such meaning every day, as Christ dwells in and among us. Christ is risen! Alleluia!

From Your Director of Learning Ministries

Well, it's May, the last full month of the school year.

Typically, I prefer not to subscribe to the saw about tempus fugit-ing; and maybe it's because of the strange winter weather that ended with separate squalls that forced many changes in things. But it does seem as if the school year has flown by in a fast way, even rushing.

Actually, Trinity Preschool Playgroup, our weekday preschool program, will enjoy its last weeks for the year this month. The school year will end with the annual carnival and picnic. The school year ahead looks full in terms of registration. While some openings remain, a number of classes have the happy problem of waiting lists. This is a satisfying predicament that is the fault of our engaging preschool director and our effective teaching staff.

All of our Sunday Church School classes continue through May and into the first part of June. Our last Sunday in the regular Church School year is June 9. (A number of adult offerings will continue or happen anew over the summer.) In May, in terms of learning and seasons, we will be preparing for Pentecost. Our middle-school students will be experiencing Secret Church; I'd tell you more but it's a secret. The Affirmation of Baptism Class will be completing its lessons and having interviews with the pastors and vicar prior to joining the church on June 9. The Life Builders Class will continue its study on Philip Yancey's book on prayer.

Over the summer, Vacation Church School will saddle up and gallop off (okay, maybe I'll mosey on). Our theme, don't you know, is Avalanche Ranch; and our children will be learning through play and activity in a western setting about our lives with Jesus—Jesus our divine pardner, I guess—I mean, Ah reckon. The dates for Vacation Church School are July 30 through August 3 and it will be a morning program. The cost is five dollars per child. There is scholarship money available if cost or supplying materials are an issue for anyone. Simply speak with me, please.

I am scheduling classes and other learning offerings for the coming school year (don't be scared, kids—of all ages! it's not for several months yet!). As I've mentioned before, it's gratifying to put together or coordinate learning experiences based on topics of interest to the parish. So if you have something—an idea, issue, point of doctrine or tradition, event of the day—that you would like to have the chance to explore further and with friends, please be in touch. Let me know what's on your mind or on your heart that we might explore more fully and together.

My penultimate note here is to thank Roberta and Roger Smith for their leadership in the Affirmation of Faith, or new members' class. While the new-members' program is not organizationally a learning-ministries program, nonetheless I appreciate the fine, dedicated teaching the Smiths have given to new members. Roger and Roberta are both adept and welcoming. In turn, I welcome Bill and Sylvia Stotler, our new leaders.

This summer I will complete my third year of service at Trinity. I feel as if I've gotten to know many of you (I hope many of you feel the same) and have certainly enjoyed working with this parish. You are a wonderful admixture of faith, convention, creativity, personality, spirit, and interest. All this gives me a great deal to do. And I am thankful for that.

Is “Christ Renews His Parish” for Me?

“I’m fairly certain that by now many of you have heard talk, or have spoken to someone briefly about Christ Renews His Parish (CRHP). As spiritual director for the last men’s weekend, I have had the wonderful occasion to speak with some of you; I have participated in power point information meetings; and I have had the opportunity to discuss with our pastors the importance and impact that CRHP can have with every adult member of Trinity.

Please allow me to take a moment to bring CRHP into clearer focus. CRHP is a structured program. It consists of three parts; the renewal weekend, team formation (to present the next weekend), and discipleship. Many things might evolve from this ministry; however, it has two main goals. Goal one, is to change the hearts and minds of all those who experience CRHP, bringing them into open, loving relationships with Christ.

As we travel through our busy lives, it is easy to place our faith walks on the back burner. That doesn’t mean that we do not love Christ; but it does indicate that many of us put other things before Christ; families, careers, etc. How many of us have said, “when I have more time, I will build a stronger, closer relationship with Jesus?” Well, brothers and sisters, time is a unique commodity; none of us knows exactly how much of it we have to consume or spend! If we do not use time wisely, we may find ourselves being caught in a situation whereby our time has run out; and we did not build that close relationship that we promised ourselves, and Christ!

When you enter CRHP, you will be presented with the opportunity for a spiritual do-over! When you complete the CRHP program, you will have a closer relationship with Christ; you will experience the joy and satisfaction that reading the Good News offers; and you will realize that prayer is the only way to strengthen and maintain your bond with Him! Your life will become more centered; and it will, almost certainly change how you communicate with spouses, family members, neighbors, and co-workers.

Goal two is to make disciples. Sound easy; it is not! We were commissioned by Christ to become disciples, and then, to make disciples of others.

Is CRHP for me! You need ask only two questions; one, am I where I want to be or need to be in my personal faith walk with Christ; and two, ask the Holy Spirit if He is calling you to attend a CRHP Renewal Weekend. If our Lord is calling you to renew your spiritual life; trust me, you will know it!
