Trinity's Way of the Cross Returns during Holy Week

The Way of the Cross is a spiritual reflection on Christ's last journey as he walked to his death on a cross at Calvary as atonement for our sins. This spiritual reflection takes many forms, from actually walking Christ's route along the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem with stops at the fourteen stations traditionally ascribed to the Way of the Cross (visit www.holylandnetwork.com/jerusalem/via_dolorosa/via_dolorosa.htm) to Lenten devotionals based on the Way of the Cross.

Once again this year during Holy Week you will be able to take your own spiritual journey along the Way of the Cross here at Trinity. The physical journey will be short – it will be totally confined to Fellowship Hall – but the spiritual journey may be long and intense for you. While others may be taking the physical journey with you as you walk from station to station, the spiritual journey is one that you will take alone, but not really alone for the Holy Spirit will be with you in your journey.

The journey will start when you pick up the devotional booklet (written by Trinity's Director of Learning Ministries, Christopher Couch) that will guide you through the fourteen stations. For each of the fourteen stations, the booklet includes scripture passages, a devotional reflection and prayer that focus on the events that occurred at that station in Jesus' final journey. At each station, there will be a work of art that is the artist's reflection on the events of that station. Fourteen Trinity artists who work in a wide variety of media contributed works of art for the stations that are the artists' spirit-led reflections on the events of the stations. Each of the works will help you in your reflection of Christ's final walk to his crucifixion.

Traditionally, the Way of the Cross begins with Christ's condemnation by Pontius Pilate. Trinity's Way of the Cross will begin a few hours earlier with Christ and his disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane and ends with Christ being laid in the tomb.

Come join Jesus on this journey along Trinity's Way of the Cross.

Blood Bank News

In the February Trinity Parish I told you that Neil and I were going on faith when I said that the January 20 Blood Drive was successful. Of course it was successful! Not because of our faith, but because Trinity has some great blood donors! We had 34 successful donors at that drive, in addition to the seven people who donated at the hospitals or donor centers. 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STAFF NOTES

Who is My Enemy? Who is My Neighbor?

The opportunity to listen to the faith stories of people of differing religious traditions through our Sup-n-Study program this Lenten season is invaluable. It helps us put into perspective our assumptions and feelings about people who differ from us. It keeps us from our tendency to develop a "we-they" mentality. Most important of all, it has the potential to de-construct our construction of who we think is our "enemy." For, at one time or another in our history, we have viewed Judaism and Islam as "enemy," either to our Christian faith or to our way of life. The consequences of viewing Jews and Muslims as "enemy" can be devastating, as seen in the Holocaust. Some would say our present war on terror is fueled by a view of Islam as "enemy."

Whether one supports or opposes our war in Iraq, the truth is that, as fallen human beings, we do indeed tend to construct a picture of the "enemy," and that construction becomes codified in a precise way. Here's the basic process, as described by James A. Aho, a professor of Sociology at Idaho State University, and the author of the book *This Thing of Darkness:* A Sociology of the Enemy:

- 1. We name or label the other, not only to describe, but also to defame or separate them from us. (Remember how "Communist" was just such a label?)
- We engage in making that label legitimate by using it in speech on sacred ground. (In other words, we employ the label in halls of legislature, in churches, in formal gatherings of people.) This makes the label stick.
- 3. We use myths to undergird the "truth" of this label. These myths can be half-truths at best, but most often false. (For example, labeling Jews as "Christ-killers," or Hitler's claim that Jews had contributed to the financial and cultural ruin of Germany after World War I.)
- 4. We use rituals to maintain a state of tension, threat, or momentum to constantly remind us of the danger of the "enemy." (For example, celebrating anniversaries of our victories over evil may not just be patriotic, but also have the effect of keeping us "on alert" about the "enemy.")

Our Lord Jesus was asked the following question by a well-educated man in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 10:25-37): Who is my neighbor? The unspoken expectation of the man was that Jesus would put parameters around who our neighbors are, and thus, parameters on just how far our love and compassion would need to extend. Jesus' response to the question? He told the parable of the Good Samaritan (an outsider, and certainly an "enemy" to those listening to Jesus) whose mercy and care for a man beaten and left at the side of the road made all the difference in that injured man's life. Jesus recognized we tend to construct who our neighbor is, along with who our enemy is, so that we can limit how far our love needs to go.

But Jesus' love knows no limit. God so loved the world that he sent his only Son—not to condemn the world, not to name and label and separate us as either neighbors or enemies, but to save the whole world through him. As we journey with Jesus to the cross and resurrection in these weeks to come, may we remember his reconciling ways, and devote ourselves to the same. May our definition of "neighbor" widen exponentially and encircle the world.

Social Ministry of the Month

Bethesda Mission

The Journey Begins At the Foot of the Cross by Ryan Hannigan, Trinity House mentor.

Since 1914, Bethesda Mission has been a missionary army of the local church, reaching out to men, women, and children of all races, nationalities and creeds, providing the poor and homeless with shelter, food, clothing, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ and discipline them in the Christian life. They operate a men's shelter, Trinity House (transitional housing facility for men), a youth center, and a women and children's shelter.

I've been blessed to serve as a mentor for one of the guys who graduated from the Helmsman Program and is now living in a single bedroom apartment in Harrisburg. I remember the first night I went to visit Jim. It was quite an adventure for me since I didn't grow up around Harrisburg and I'm actually from southern York County. But God's grace and faithfulness was with me as I journeyed to the unknown city streets. I found out that Jim was the same age as me but as he puts it, "down on his luck."

Years earlier, Jim had started selling things to pay for his alcohol addiction. He said to me, "Sad isn't it? So you see, not only the 'druggies' sell stuff or steal to support their habit." This habit led to Jim losing everything - his job, his home, his wife, and his 10-year-old son. Alcohol had taken over his life. After months on the street, Jim found a room at Bethesda Mission, and there he learned about Jesus Christ.

Jim still has rough days, like when he relapsed again last summer and drank an entire case of beer with one of his buddies. But he has discovered something - something deeply personal and meaningful. Not a day goes by where he doesn't thank God for getting him through another day sober. Jim tells me that when he feels the urge, that's when "it's time to hit my knees."

Bethesda Mission, in Harrisburg, gives hurting men, women and children the opportunity to climb the steps of the mission and find the same peace in their lives that many of their graduates have experienced. March Class on the Apocrypha

What is the Apocrypha? (Hint–it's not the same as the gnostic collection.) Do Lutherans acknowledge the Apocrypha? (Yes, we do.) Over three Sundays in March-March 4, 11, and 18-we will have a Special Topics Class on the Apocrypha during the Church School hour (9:30 to 10:30 a.m.). This collection of ancient history, prophecy, wisdom, and fable was a regular part of the Christian Bible for a thousand years. And Catholics, Episcopalians, and Lutherans respect the Apocrypha still. The Apocrypha, in fact, was published as part of one of the first, great Protestant translations of Scripture, The King James Bible. Our class will read through the Apocrypha and in our discussion consider the reasons for its inclusion or lack of inclusion in the Bible. The class will be led by Christopher Couch, Director of Learning Ministries. All Trinity members and guests are invited to all or part of the class, which will meet in Room 126.

The homeless coordinator for the children is Vera White who is a member of city council. She acknowledged on Channel 20 at the council's December 12 meeting that the "knitters of Trinity Lutheran" had donated 78 knit caps, 59 knit glove sets and 34 knit scarves.

The Special Concerns Committee of the Women of Trinity have been asked to be present at their Christmas party next year should we decide to again donate to them.

A letter was received on December 28 from the Harrisburg School District thanking Trinity for their generous support and relating that contributions such as ours make an incredible difference to what is available to their students.

Travel around the world and stay close to home with a Global Mission Event

Here are two great opportunities for reasonablypriced family vacations-and you'll travel around the globe and experience the difference we make.

The first is the Friday and Saturday of Memorial Day weekend—May 23 and 24—with a Mini-Global Mission Event right here at Trinity. The second is the ELCA Global Mission Event July 17-20 at the University of Wisconsin in LaCrosse, Wisconsin.

Global mission events help us to receive the gifts of Christians and churches around the world. Through large group presentations, workshops, and worship, participants deepen their understanding of mission. Special programming for children, junior high school students, and senior high school students helps learn how they can live as faithful Christians in a global culture.

The Crosses of Trinity

The Gathering Space art exhibit for the month of March features the Crosses of Trinity - photographs of many of the various crosses, crucifixes and Christus Rexes that are scattered throughout the building. These photographs were taken by various members of the congregation and in many cases the crosses have very special meaning to the photographers. The cross is an important reminder to us of the gift that Christ gave to us by offering his life as the ultimate sacrifice for our salvation. Throughout Trinity there are many reminders of this sacrifice from very plain, wooden crosses to ornate brass crosses, from crucifixes with the suffering Christ to Christus Rexes with the victorious Christ, all captured through the artistic eyes of our photographers.
