## Concert Series begins with United States Army Chorus

The 2008/2009 Concert Series of Trinity Lutheran Church begins on Sunday afternoon, September 21 at 4:00 p.m. with a performance by the famous **United States Army Chorus**.

From its inception, the chorus has established and maintained a reputation of excellence in the performance of choral literature.

Beyond the traditional military music and patriotic standards, the repertoire of the chorus covers a broad spectrum which includes pop, Broadway, folk and classical music.

The chorus, whose membership includes Trinity member Jason Gottshall (pictured front row, 3<sup>rd</sup> from left), performs often at the White House and in support of functions hosted by the State Department and Department of Defense. The chorus participated in the dedications of the Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan, and George Bush Presidential Libraries, and is a standard feature at each presidential inaugural. The chorus also sings for state funerals – the last being for President Ronald Reagan in 2004.

World leaders, such as Queen Elizabeth II and former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev have been serenaded by the group during state visits. The chorus also regularly appears with the National Symphony in televised Memorial Day and Independence Day performances from the U.S Capitol. Early seating is advised. Free-will offering.

### STAFF NOTES

#### Needs versus Wants

It was gratifying to read in the August 10<sup>th</sup> bulletin insert, *Trinity Today*, that over \$5,000 had been raised for the World Hunger Appeal. World Hunger Sunday (August 3<sup>rd</sup>) offered a marvelous opportunity for bread bakers and bread lovers in our congregation to join forces and fight hunger on a global level.

What I found most gratifying was our level of giving at a time when the prices of gas and groceries have skyrocketed, and our dollars are stretched to the hilt. Here at Trinity we held World Hunger Sunday, asking for your participation, while newspapers and television and Internet sites are busy suggesting ways for us to cut down our costs and reduce our spending. We're eating out less, wearing old apparel longer, taking the bus. We're bringing to the office the coffee we made at home. We're keeping our vehicle another year or two.

Yet even as we worry about our own personal financial situations, we still give generously to feed a hungry world.

Matthew's Gospel offers us an interesting glimpse into the twelve disciples. The first disciples of our Lord Jesus, when called by him to "fish for people," left everything, including their day job and their hometown. Frankly, I think they did so without counting the cost. This was "impulse buying" into Jesus' kingdom message. Later on, when they came back to their worldly senses, they would voice their worries to Jesus about what they would eat and drink and wear. Apparently, gleaning leftover bits of grain from an already-harvested field wasn't their idea of three-squares-a-day. The few resources they did have at their disposal they only reluctantly turned over to Jesus to feed the crowds. Time after time, Jesus' closest friends saw only scarcity, and not abundance, in their lives. But the Lord Jesus consistently worked to quell their fears. He assured them God knew exactly what they needed. He called them to lives of faith and trust.

Jesus wasn't making frugality the latest fad. He merely was reminding them of the difference between needs and wants. Or, as Paul Escamilla writes in his book *Longing for Enough in a Culture of More*: "We must learn what it means to listen to inner longings other than the appetite for more, longings that quietly assert that enough is enough, and then to heed these sacred stirrings by the different ways we begin to live and trust."

Could it be that, in our receiving God's Word, we are learning how to distinguish between needs and wants? Could it be we are learning to forego our wants, but will not rest until others' needs are met? That's precisely what I like to believe is happening among us. Thanks be to God. Remember the poor.

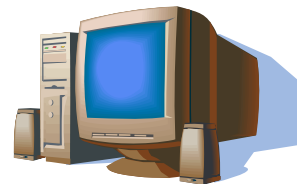

## Corn Helps to Buy Truck for Needy in Haiti

Recently a group of Trinity volunteers spent a morning and afternoon picking, husking, cutting and packaging 50+ dozens of sweet corn. Our freezer is now bulging with almost 75 quarts of corn for use at the congregational Thanksgiving Dinner and shut-in meal deliveries coming up in November. The home frozen corn we bought for serving last year was a big hit so we were pleased when Doug Bonsall was able to get the corn from some Lutheran friends in Juniata County.

The friends own a farm and were very generous in donating hundreds of dozens of corn annually to several organizations that use the vegetable to serve meals for charitable purposes. Their small country church of about 140 members – St. John’s (Barner’s) Lutheran Church near Liverpool – is pastured by a former Trinity associate, Rev. Peter Kuebler, and has become known as the “Apple Butter Church”. For more than 50 years, this congregation and its friends have sponsored a huge apple butter boil and Pennsylvania Dutch dinner with all proceeds going to benevolent causes in the community and the wider church.

Some years ago, this rural congregation was inspired by a guest speaker who described the tremendous human needs in Haiti, the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere. That message ignited a flame in this church and since then volunteers have gone to the same remote village in Haiti once or twice annually to build a school, support an orphanage, provide basic necessities and conduct a summer church school program. Their biggest project yet is now underway to purchase a new truck so badly needed for the use of this village; \$19,000 of the \$31,000 needed for the truck has already been raised and given by these hard working and generous Lutherans.

When Doug tried to pay for the corn obtained for Trinity Church, the farmer’s comment was, “We don’t sell our corn when you’re using it for the church.” Finally, after many protestations against taking any money, the farmer said that any contribution made for the corn would go to their church’s Haiti Truck Fund to help those who “are much needier than I who have been blessed with so much”. As we enjoy the corn later this fall, may it provide a reminder of one family’s extreme generosity and inspire us to do similar acts of random kindness.

## "Prayers" Needed

Have you felt the power of prayer? Do you like to pray for people? Could you pray for 15 minutes for someone in need when the call came?

People **are** comforted when they know they are being prayed for and wouldn't it be "Christ like" to help out our fellow parishioners from time to time with only a prayer?

Let me re-introduce the 24 Hour Prayer Vigil here at Trinity. Some of you may have "used" this "service" before; for the rest of us let me tell you a little about it.

The 24 Hour Prayer Vigil is a ministry that offers continuous prayer for a 24 hour period. It is done by request only when a person(s) is experiencing a crisis situation of a vital nature or operation of a vital nature where 24 hours of prayer would get them through it.

Once a request has been received the ministry alerts its "prayers" to the specific need and each "prayer" at their predetermined time (such as 9:30 p.m. – 9:45 p.m.) will pray for the person(s) in need for their 15 minutes.

Since this is a *by request only* service, it is not a daily commitment to 15 minutes of prayer, you are only called when the need arises.

When we pray, we are in God's presence. When we pray to God on behalf of someone else we are doing something pleasing to Him, interceding for one of his children in need. Therefore, both the person being prayed for and the person doing the praying will be blessed.

*“Funding the Largest Pocket of Poverty in  
Central PA – The Allison Hill Fund”*

“The Allison Hill Fund” will be our designated recipient of our 2008-2009 Blessing Box donations.

The fund was started in July 2005 to fund eleven faith-based groups that do societal ministries in the Allison Hill area. Allison Hill is the biggest pocket of poverty in Pennsylvania outside the cities of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. The children who grow up there have less than a 50% chance of ever graduating from high school. While most of the groups deal with children and their single parent families, some groups have food distribution and some deal only with men coming out of prison or off addiction. The goal of the fund is to raise \$400,000 a year so each group can count on \$35,000 a year to continue or expand their programs. The groups are multi-denominational, and include Christ Lutheran Church and their medical outreach program. Eight of the eleven groups wonder from year to year if they will have the funding to continue. We are trying to help in this effort.

## Women of Trinity October Circle Study

### *Philippians, God’s Guide to Joy*

The author of this study, Ron Klug, describes it as follows: One of the most joyful books ever written came from a man in prison who was facing possible execution. The man was Paul, and the book, his letter to the Philippians. It has been called the ‘Epistle of Joy’ because it reverberates with the words joy, glad, and rejoice. The theme of the book is “I rejoice; you can rejoice, too.”

All who are seeking more joy in life—and that means nearly everyone—can find in this short book God’s guide to joy, written by a man who faced head-on all the evils and troubles of the world—misunderstanding, sickness, abandonment by friends, persecution by enemies, imprisonment, doubts, despair—and yet could say, “Rejoice in the Lord always, I will say it again: Rejoice!”

While our attention will be on the letter to the Philippians, we will look from time to time at other parts of the bible that cast light on this book—especially the book of Acts, which recounts Paul’s life and the experience that led him to write this letter. By comparing different parts of the bible, we will use a basic principle of interpretation: We let scripture interpret scripture.
