American Boychoir to Perform at Trinity

Trinity's 2008-2009 Concert Series continues on Saturday evening, November 8 at 7 p.m. with **The American Boychoir** from Princeton, N.J.

Celebrating its 70th anniversary season, **The American Boychoir**, under the direction of music director Fernando Malvar-Ruiz, is regarded as the United States' premier concert boys' choir and one of the finest boychoirs in the world. It continues to dazzle audiences with its unique blend of musical sophistication, effervescent spirit and ensemble virtuosity.

Boys from grades four through eight, reflecting the ethnic, religious and cultural diversity of our nation - come from nine states and four foreign countries to pursue a rigorous musical and academic curriculum at The American Boychoir School, the only non-sectarian boys' choir school in the nation.

Advent Wreathmaking for All the Morning of November 23

Over the past few years, we've reinvigorated Trinity's tradition at the church of making Advent wreaths for use in the home. The best day to have this church activity is Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday of the church year and the Sunday before the first Sunday in Advent. We typically make the wreaths in the afternoon or early evening. This year, because of the way the calendar falls, Christ the King Sunday is already the date for our church Thanksgiving dinner.

The rotation classes in our Sunday Church School have offered the use of their classrooms on the morning of November 23 for Advent wreathmaking. So at 9:30 (a.m.), any family may come to the Bibleland Room (Room 122) to receive materials and instructions on making home Advent wreaths. And then the wreaths may be made in the classroom space. A devotional to use while lighting the candles at home during the season of Advent will be available, too.

There is no cost required, though a free-will offering will be taken. So that the right number and amount of materials will be on hand, please register by writing your name on a list. We'll keep one list on the reception desk in the Gathering Space and one in the rotation area (the first floor of the education wing). You may simply set down the family name and how many will be coming.

This is not regular Sunday Church School for the rotation classes, so ***no children should be dropped for class on November 23***. This is instead an invitation for ***everyone to come together as families in a special way***. Whether your family is many or few or one, I encourage you to attend this gathering which will prepare us for the new church year's first season and our remembrance of Jesus Christ coming into the world.



STAFF NOTES

Project Connect

In September, I spent four days in Atlanta to receive training as a Discernment Advocate for Project Connect. As I will be in this position for the next eighteen months, I've borrowed Staff Notes from Pastor Easton to talk about Project Connect.

What is Project Connect?

The full title is "Project Connect: Calling Leaders for a Changing World," and it is an initiative of the Eastern Cluster of Lutheran Seminaries (which are in Philadelphia, Gettysburg, and Southern-Columbia SC). Project Connect is funded by the Lilly Endowment, Inc.

What is it about?

The purpose of Project Connect is to find and encourage young people, ages 18-30, to consider a church vocation (pastor, associate in ministry, diaconal minister, and other areas of public ministry). An enthusiastic network of partners work together to provide theologically sound vocational discernment programs for the target audience. This endeavor will be accomplished by identifying young adults who have faith, passion, integrity, vision, self-awareness, and motivation for a lifetime of service as pastors, associates in ministry, diaconal and in other vocations of public ministry; nurturing relationships with those who are open to a process that extends, deepens, and provides focus for vocational discernment; and sustaining these relationships by providing profound experiences in congregational ministry.

What does a Discernment Advocate do?

Discernment Advocates serve Project Connect in a variety of ways, but basically are here to bring "flesh and blood, breath and life" to Project Connect. Discernment Advocates are here to start that face to face, personal encouragement to listen to God's call going on in the lives of each individual.

As people are identified by pastors, congregation members, teachers, or whomever, I will talk with them individually, and bring them together in small groups, to talk about call, ministry, and seminary (or whatever may be on their minds).

These young people will be drawn from all walks of life throughout our synod. Some travel may be involved, but those expenses are covered by Project Connect. I will be involved in some programming at all three seminaries during the next eighteen months. I hope to lead some discussions with various conferences, and to make a presentation next June at our annual Synod Assembly (which I attend as a rostered pastor).

Project Connect is targeting young people throughout Regions 7, 8 & 9, which encompasses twenty-one synods (as well as the afore mentioned three seminaries), so this is more than just finding folk here at Trinity.

As Christians, we are called to be servants, and to use the gifts given us, which include identifying leaders. As I and Trinity work with Project Connect, together we strive to live out the gospel.

There is truly something on almost every weekend. It will be all good!

The month of September was awesome and great in every way. We started the month off with our first YG NITE on the 14th. Around 70 YG and advisors came out for the night of faith, fun, and fellowship. The topic of the YG NITE was 'WHAT IS YG?' We discussed all of the 'in-and-outs' of what YG is all about. We talked about our traditions, shared our verses, talked about the symbol, sang our psalms, and prayed together. Somewhere in there, we even found time to play games, eat pizza, and get to know one another better. It was a very full YG NITE from start to finish. The very next weekend was the synod-wide Jr. High event called ALIVE, ALIVE. This is like my 15th or so year taking kids to this event and this year was definitely one of the best yet. We took 15 Jr. High and three advisors to this event. We were even represented by three other of our YG advisors serving as staff for the actual event. This weekend was fabulous! The theme for this year's event was TRANSFORMATION and it focused on Christ being a transformer in our lives, in our service toward others. It was a powerful message conveyed through large group and small group time. The weekend was a blast, and I know that our YG had a lot of fun and learned a lot as well. We closed down the month with another YG NITE on the 28th. Around 70 YG and advisors came out for the night of faith, fun and fellowship. The topic of this YG NITE was 'GETTING TO KNOW YOU'. While the YG, this nite was focused basically on 'getting to know' night was centered around 'getting to know' one another. So the whole nite was designed to get the youth to feel comfortable sharing who they are with everyone. Through names, games, discussion, and lessons in large and small groups this was accomplished. This nite as well as the month of September went very well. It was certainly a positive step for the new season.



This year is a gathering year as well, which calls for extra planning and preparation. Every three years the ELCA hosts the NATIONAL YOUTH GATHERING which is a nation-wide event gathering youth, pastors, and advisors from everywhere. Next summer's gathering is in New Orleans. All preparations for our YG's attendance are being made as we speak by me and Tania Springer. As of now, we have 10 Sr. High YG and four advisors registered for next summer's event. So the two biggest hurdles from three years ago have been overcome, so that is a tremendous weight lifted off of our shoulders. There is still a lot to do and a lot to figure out, so the work has only really just begun. Our biggest challenge now is raising the \$ needed to go. It costs over \$1,000 to go to an event of this magnitude. The youth pay some of this cost, the church budget pays for some of this cost, and we raise some of this cost through YG fundraisers. Bountiful Blessings

Adventures in Bibleland, Trinity's Elementary Sunday school program, kicked off the 2008 - 2009 school year with a blast back in time to learn about different biblical events with a discussion about Moses from his birth and early life to the time when he was a shepherd and was called by God from the burning bush. In October, the children learned about the Plagues, Passover and the Escape.

Sunday school incorporates different methods to explain the concepts through drama, science, cooking, games and videos. The stories are often enhanced through hands-on activities.

This year our Rotation Sunday School Mission Partner is Bountiful Blessings, which serves need-based families in the area. The goal of the organization is to provide non-consumable goods to families during temporary times of financial hardship. During the month of September the children collected diapers, wipes and other baby items and in their efforts collected over 80 items! October's collection involved toilet paper and tissues.

In November we will be participating in Bountiful Blessings' Christmas/Holiday Gift Program. We will be collecting new books for children ages newborn to 17. Rolls of wrapping paper (new or unused) may be brought. In December, we will be collecting new or gently used stuffed animals.

In November and December, contributions will be received in the rotation area, the first floor of the education wing on Sunday mornings.

Social Ministry

Bethesda Mission

For 94 years Bethesda Mission has helped poor and homeless people regain productive lives by offering food, shelter and life-changing programs. Trinity has financially supported the Men's Shelter in Harrisburg for many years, while eight members currently serve as mentors. Last year Bethesda served over 76,000 meals and provided more than 9,300 bags of groceries.
