Annus horribilis. Yet perhaps even those who look upon 2010 as a horrible year now turn with gladness and hope to 2011, turn the page on a new calendar that is open and ripe with all its possibilities and potential.

To look with gladness and hope to the New Year dawning is much more than simple “optimism.” For scripture reminds us that God’s transforming power is always at work in God’s creation. **Newness abounds around us!** Isaiah spoke for the Lord God to bedraggled exiles when he prophesied, “I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth; do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.” (Isaiah 43:19) **Newness abounds—even in you and me!** St. Paul encouraged the young Church in Corinth with these words: “So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation.” (2 Corinthians 5:17-18) Having been baptized into the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we are immersed (okay, Lutherans usually are sprinkled at the font, but stay with me here)...we are **immersed** in all the possibilities and potential of new life for ourselves, our relationships with others, and our daily journey as disciples in this world God’s given us.

It’s been nearly a year since we bid a fond “goodbye” to our long-time senior pastor as he headed into retirement. But since then we have continued to be about the task of Christ’s ministry in this place, and have been ably led by our interim Senior Pastor, who has blessed us with his wisdom, energy, and heart. Our congregation’s resources have been stretched as we struggle with the ongoing financial recession that is plaguing so many institutions, municipalities, companies, and individuals. Help Your Child Understand Holy Communion

Is your child curious about Holy Communion? Does your child want to participate in communion just like you? These are signs your child is ready to share in the Lord's Supper. There is no command from Jesus Christ about how old a child should be in order to receive the meal. Our Lord's invitation to receive God's grace and love in the meal is available to all who are part of God's family through Holy Baptism.

Children in grades K-5 have the opportunity to learn more about Holy Communion in a three-week program in January. On January 9, 16 and 23, during the 9:30 a.m. Sunday Church School hour, they will study biblical stories including the Last Supper of Jesus, learn about the Christian tradition of the Sacrament of Holy Communion, and come to understand the gifts given to us every time we share in this meal.

Our three pastors as well will lead discussion with particular grade groups, and take the children on a "field trip" to a Trinity altar to see communion ware and elements. The schedule is, January 9 (Pastor Easton, Grades 2 and 3), January 16 (Pastor Ludwig, Grades K and 1) and January 23 (Pastor Brock, Grades 4 and 5). Parents are welcome to attend these sessions with their children. These classes will be held on the first floor of the education wing.

Additional resources about Holy Communion for families to use at home are always available through the Director of Learning Ministries, Christopher Couch.



Artists of the Month

Women of Trinity Prayer Shawl Ministry

The January exhibit will feature a different kind of art – a display of beautiful prayer shawls created by members of Trinity’s Prayer Shawl Ministry.

Formed in 2004, the ministry has become a vital part of Trinity’s outreach to those hospitalized, confined to their home, nursing facility, or family members who are grieving the loss of a loved one. Some lap robes are made and given to CURE International, an organization based in Lemoyne, with hospitals in Third World countries where medical care is desperately needed. They are in need of blankets for newborn babies in Kabul, Afghanistan, a country with severe cold weather.

The group meets the fourth Thursday of each month from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. with an average of 15 women attending. They do crocheting, knitting and cro-knitting. Ideas are shared, shawls completed and handed in and they ask God to bless them that they may be tangible evidence of the love and prayers of our congregation. Since 2004, 520 shawls have been made and 485 distributed.

The group welcomes anyone who crochets, knits, cro-knits or wishes to learn. For more information, contact Kay Range, Coordinator, at 697-1871.

Women of Trinity

Campbell Labels for Education are being collected by Women of Trinity. To date 1,629 labels have been collected. These labels are given to the Trinity Preschool Playgroup so that they can purchase school materials and equipment. You can help by tearing labels off of Campbell soups, Prego and Pepperridge Farm Products or any item that has a Label for Education barcode on it. Bring the labels to the reception desk in the Gathering Space.

Trinity Preschool Playgroup is 35 years old. From a group of half a dozen mothers and children, its enrollment has grown to 100 students participating in four different age groups: 2 1/2 year old class, 3 year old classes, 4 year old pre-K classes and an older pre-K class.

The Preschool has two purposes: kindergarten readiness and socialization. Its motto is “Learning through Play”. It is a half day program that runs September through May. Trinity families comprise 40% of the enrollment. Remaining families often join the church when they become involved in the preschool. The school has a waiting list and has not advertised for six years.

To learn more about the Preschool, you can talk to Christopher Couch, our Director of Learning Ministries. Nancy Martin, our Office Manager was the Preschool Director from 1978-1990. Her daughter, Amy Koch, is now one of its teachers. The current director is Heather Rose. Also Trinity members Angie Clark and Amy Czyzyk are on the teaching staff.

Blood Bank News

As I told you before, January 2011 begins a new year for Trinity's Blood Bank and that means instead of being over our goal; we begin at the big 0. I hope that many of you made New Year's Resolutions to become regular blood donors! Forgot to sign up? Be sure to come anyway on January 23, 7:45 – 11:00 a.m!

Sign up is in the Gathering Space, after all the services, on Sundays, January 9 and 16. Both the Central PA Blood Bank, and Jeanie, appreciates having you sign up for a specific time, since we can at least attempt to keep things moving. This also gives us an indication of how many workers CPBB should assign to Trinity for a specific drive. You may feel it doesn't make any difference, ("But, I have to wait anyway!") -- believe me, it does! When I last talked to my CPBB contact, as of the end of November, we had contributed 203 units of blood! Hooray for Trinity! They won't accept my blood, so I badger the rest of you!

As we all experience the cold winter weather, Trinity members are encouraged to also consider the homeless within our own community. Once again this year, Trinity members are needed to staff the Winter Homeless Shelter at Susquehanna Harbor Safe Haven, located at 1805 North 12th Street (*near the State Farm Show Complex*). Two volunteers are needed each night for the week of Sunday, January 16 through Saturday, January 22, 2011.

Christian Churches United provides a paid staff person to be on duty within the facility 24 hours daily. In addition, there is a part time staff person who does the 'intake' of shelter guests each evening. Volunteers from Trinity carpool over, arriving about 8:00 p.m. and spend the night, leaving about 7:00 a.m. the following morning. Please consider being a part of this ministry! CACCC Thanks You!

Some of you might be asking, what is CACCC? CACCC stands for Churches Affiliated Child Care Centers, which encompasses two local daycare centers located in Enola and at Camp Hill United Methodist Church. CACCC also has before and after school care for elementary aged students at several elementary schools in Camp Hill and Dillsburg. Trinity was one of the five founding churches for CACCC over twenty years ago to help low-income mothers who were going back to work and needed to obtain quality daycare for their preschoolers. CACCC provides short-term scholarships to eligible parents while they wait to be subsidized by the Childcare Network.

How is Trinity supporting CACCC?

We provide representation on their board of directors for their monthly meetings. Judy Leslie and Margy Fox are the current representatives.

We provide support for their fundraising efforts, which provides scholarship money. Trinity has purchased Bon-Ton coupons for Community Days, where the money raised is evenly disbursed among the local agencies which help those in need. We also buy chocolate advent calendars. Trinity sold \$550.00 worth of calendars this year. CACCC was also one of the benevolence ministries represented on our Giving Tree this year.

While there are skills for becoming a good boy scout, including first aid, camping and orienteering, becoming an Eagle Scout requires developing leadership skills, which cannot be learned from a book."

Luke is a graduate of Mechanicsburg High School and is attending Harrisburg Area Community College majoring in Mathematics. His goal is to become a commercial pilot. His parents are Byron and Becky Ensor of Shiremanstown. He has one brother, Blake.

New Friends from Afar Preschool Class both Sends and Receives Remembrances from Afghanistan

Trinity Preschool Playgroup, a part of our church community (not an outside organization that rents space from us), has been operating for more than thirty years. Currently about a hundred students are enrolled. There are five classes with two teachers in each class, with Heather Rose oversees the entire program as Preschool Director.

One of the preschool classes is run by Susan Walsh, lead teacher, and Denise Staats, assisting teacher. This class, made up of prekindergarten children, crafted a number of items early in the school year to send to US soldiers serving in Afghanistan.

The original request came from one of the preschool parents, Jennifer Graf, whose father-in-law has been serving as a surgeon in Afghanistan.

The children were read the story of *Nubs*, a true story about a dog in Iraq befriended by American soldiers and eventually sent to the US to live with one of them. Inspired by the story, the children drew pictures. Then a large American flag was made on butcher paper; the children pressed their painted handprints to make the strips and used their thumbprints to render the stars. They enjoyed making and sending everything to the soldiers and, naturally enough, figured that was that.

But it wasn't. In November on Veterans' Day, the class received a visit from Colonel Graf himself, who came bearing greetings, gifts, and stories from the Armed Forces personnel who had received the students' remembrances. Chief among the items brought to the class was a large American flag that was flown over the base where the children's handmade gifts and greetings had been displayed. The flag was accompanied by a framed certificate, noting with gratitude the sharing of the children's work with the soldiers on base. Plus photographs were given of the children's craftwork being displayed inside the military facility and of the American flag flying over the base at that time.

This return of giving was entirely unexpected by the class. Their aim had been to give—and to give without any thought of receiving any response. After all, our persons in Afghanistan have enough to do, don't they?



But the class was remembered and, in a way, saluted for their thoughtful recognition of the Americans serving overseas in a dangerous place. Among the stories from Afghanistan that were shared was the soldiers' insistence that the children's work remain on display (the intention having been to take them down after a while). What the children had sent, certainly, were reminders of home and the kind of peace of home—and preserving that peace—that had brought Americans to Afghanistan, in the first place. And the base personnel wanted to have those reminders perpetually on display.

"We had been wanting to do this activity for a while," commented Susan Walsh, "And now we have a contact for sending the students' work over. In the spring, we're going to do this again."

And so new friends were made. Remembrance was sent, and gratitude was sent back. Talk about a win-win strategy. Even though this strategy was serendipity.
