Pastor Hardy to Receive Pastor Emeritus Status

The Congregation Council, upon recommendation from the Administration and Personnel Committee, has unanimously voted to confer the honorary title of Pastor Emeritus to The Rev. J. Stewart Hardy. The conferral will take place at the beginning of the 10:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services on December 4. A reception will be held in Fellowship Hall immediately following the 11:00 a.m. service and everyone is encouraged to attend.

In 1991, Trinity bestowed this honor upon The Rev. Harold Haas on the 50th anniversary of his ordination and "to recognize the extraordinary contribution Pastor Haas made to this congregation as its interim pastor."

The title "Pastor Emeritus" carries with it no responsibilities or expectations. It is simply a way for a congregation to recognize the distinguished and faithful service of a pastor to a congregation.

While Pastor Hardy isn't preaching at Trinity these days, we give thanks that he was called to Trinity for many years to proclaim God's Word, to baptize new members into the church, to announce forgiveness and to preside at celebrations of the Lord's Supper. Beyond those important roles, he comforted us in times of sickness and trouble and at the death of our loved ones, shared our joys, and blessed the congregation and our community. Equally significant, Pastor Hardy challenged us to live out the Gospel mission in our daily lives and his words continue to inspire our ministries. We give thanks for the significant leadership role he played for more than two decades as our senior pastor and as an important part of the Trinity family and our history.

We hold Pastor Hardy and Barbara in our prayers and give thanks for the partnership in the gospel we have enjoyed with them.

Ephesians 4:8-13 "When Jesus ascended to the heights, he led a parade of captives and gave gifts to his people...He is the one who gave these gifts to the church: pastors and teachers. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ..."

LIFE IS MESSY. We'll begin there this month. From the time of creation, where God brought order out of chaos and the two fools in the garden (who look and act like us) decided to mess with it by disobeying the one (and only one) command they were given, to our present world – life is messy.

Do we need examples? Let's start with birth. We come into this world from the warm comfort of a mother's womb covered in fluid and blood, kicking and screaming, needy and demanding, fragile yet resilient. We're a mess when we're born. Then, we end up in homes with naïve, broken, flawed folks who've neglected to read the "parenting" manual that was supposed to come with us. Imperfect, struggling folks barely into any form of adulthood themselves, suddenly charged with the greatest responsibility any of us will ever know in this world. Yikes!!! Messy work, indeed, done by messy folks whose best efforts are all too often tainted with their own needs.

And what about the messiness of our relationships? There isn't room enough here to name all those possible dysfunctions, but we know them or are a part of them or contribute to them. Did you grow up fighting and arguing with a sibling or two? Messy stuff. Even the scriptures tell us of such in story after story stretching back to Jacob and Esau. How about those "on-again-off-again" relationships with school friends – best buds one day, arch-enemies the next? Messy business, friendships. Then there is the penultimate (next to the top spot) relationship fraught with the highest euphoria we can experience and still capable of plunging us into the darkest pit we can know. Do I have to spell that one out? Okay, I'll say it, just for the sake of redundancy – marriage can be messy stuff!

Which brings us along the road to our ultimate relationship – us and our Maker. Messy maybe? Who hasn't wrestled with the tragedies of life and wondered where God went? Who hasn't stood alone in prayer and felt the awful silence of the One who promised in our baptism to be with us ALWAYS? Who hasn't felt the fracturing of this relationship as we confess our own disobedience, echoing and repeating the scene in the garden with our brother Adam and our sister Eve? Messy, indeed.

Such is the life we live and the world we all know. And it was into just such a world that Jesus was born, messy himself from the detritus of humanity – the blood and fluid, the smells and sights of an animal shelter, the cries of birth pains and the wail of infant lungs invaded by cold air. It was and is a messy, dark world that Jesus entered. God's Son born in the humblest of places and the most inauspicious of circumstances.

And yet . . . and yet **this** birth, messy and ordinary in so many ways, has brought life and order, love and forgiveness, peace and goodwill not only into a dark winter world, but into our lives – lighting a way for us to live in spite of the messinesses and warming our hearts so that there is always room for others to share in our journeys.

You are invited this year, as every year, to experience the fullness of Advent, where the light of candles each week begins to push the darkness of this world further and further into the corners, and the warmth of God's love reaches through any and all messiness we know in our lives offering us peace and joy.

"For to us a child is born." Emmanuel is His name – God with us, even in the mess.

Senior Pastor Bible Study January - May 2012

The Sr. Pastor Bible Study for the winter/spring of 2012 will be the study of the New Testament book of Acts. The class meets on Thursday mornings from 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. and Thursday evenings from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m. All persons are welcome to attend.

Written sometime between 70 and 100 A.D., it tells the story of the development and spread of the early church. Scholars believe the author to be the same person who wrote the Gospel of Luke. Since we are, in essence, a story-formed community as a church, it makes sense that the early church was documented in story form. Some have even suggested that the title of the book is miss-named; that it should not read "The Acts of the Apostles," but rather, "The Acts of the Holy Spirit." Luke's concern was not necessarily to follow all the disciples as they spread the word about Jesus, but to show how the Gospel was spread into every corner of the gentile world.

New Hope Ministries... ...Just a Food Bank?

Each month Trinity's Social Ministry Committee highlights one of its ministries and New Hope Ministries is featured for the month of December. This is a non-denominational Christian organization, headquartered in Dillsburg, with service centers in Dillsburg, Dover, and a newly renovated center in Mechanicsburg. Our committee members are sometimes asked, 'Is New Hope Ministries just a food bank?'

One only needs to read their mission statement to realize that New Hope Ministries is much more than *just a food bank*. New Hope Ministries is a Christian social service agency that shows the love and hope of Christ by serving our neighbors in times of need and supporting their efforts toward stability.' When individuals and/or families find themselves faced with a crisis, they often need much more than food; although food and safe shelter are always of primary concern. The crisis could be a death in the immediate family, a serious illness, the loss of a job, spousal abandonment, shutoff of utilities, medical emergencies, tutoring needs, transportation needs, legal needs, youth needs, counseling needs, and the list goes on and on.

Our area is very much blessed to have such a committed faith-based agency ready to provide immediate assistance. New Hope Ministries can only be successful when they have the support of the local communities. Area churches provide several resources, primarily money and volunteers. Trinity Lutheran Church has a long history of providing financial support; and in recent years, we have witnessed a marked increase in the number of volunteers from our congregation!

The Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is made of a circle of greens holding four candles, (one for each Sunday in Advent) and, sometimes, a candle in the center. The circle represents God's eternity, without be



resents God's eternity, without beginning or end, and the perfect nature of God as revealed in Christ. The evergreens represent God's gift of life and growth and life to come. The four candles represent the four Sundays before Christmas. The four Gospels and the four great words of the season – "Prepare you the way". The flame represents the coming of Christ as the Light of the World, the shining light which dispels all darkness.

On the First Sunday, only one candle is lit. The dimness of this one candle symbolizes the darkness of the world before the coming of Christ. The circle of light increases each Sunday with the lighting of successive candles. On Christmas the whole wreath is ablaze with light as the Christ candle is lit to announce His coming.



Fellowship Hall Improvements Update

This past month potential contractors have toured our facility in order to place bids on the work needed to upgrade Fellowship Hall. We expect to select the winning bids and make a recommendation to Congregation Council in early December. There will be four contracts awarded: General Construction, Electrical, Audio Visual and Lighting. A Project Manager will oversee the work.
