Staff Notes

"Hospitality" The Reverend Glenn E. Ludwig

Grandma Ludwig used to sweep her side porch, the main entrance into her house, every day. Every day – regardless of the weather. She lived in that home until she was 99, basically blind, and stubbornly independent. And every day, the porch got swept.

While observing her sweeping one day, I asked her why she did that. "In case of company," came the clipped response.

Of course, why didn't I know that? Grandma was practicing what we talk about a lot in churches these days – hospitality. It's the reason she always used her best plates when even we came for dinner. It was the reason she moved her car so others could easily park in the driveway. It was the reason we always had enough food to feed twice the number gathered – hospitality.

It is a concept and a practice that has become something of a buzz word in church circles. We examine our internal and external signs to see if they are helpful as visitors try to find nurseries or bathrooms or classrooms. We talk about parking issues as measures of how hospitable we are. We offer bread for first-time visitors as a sign of welcome and friendliness. We even print communion instructions so visitors can feel comfortable joining us around the table of Christ. All hospitality issues.

Recently, another hospitality issue came to light at Trinity, one that has taken much staff time to deal with. It is the issue of offering an alternative to wine for those for whom alcohol is a problem. It is not a theological issue; it is a hospitality issue, and one that was complicated for us to figure out. With six services a week and five of them being very different in style and order, how do we offer grape juice as an alternative without making it awkward, cumbersome, and/or embarrassing to those who would wish to partake?

Well, we think we have the solution. Tree of Life Lutheran Church, our friends on the east shore, use a wine product called Fre – a wine produced by Sutter Home that removes the alcohol but preserves the flavors of the wine. The alcohol percentage then is less than .5%. As our staff has discussed this with the pastor's of Tree of Life, they claim that it solves the logistical problem of trying to offer Christ's blood in the sacrament in two forms – wine and grape juice.

Believe me, our staff has studied this issue for nine months now. We think it is the best logistical solution to the hospitality issue, and we have proposed to the Worship Committee that we move to the use of Fre for communion. There are some logistical issues yet to solve, including the refrigeration of open bottles for preservation sake, but we don't think these are insurmountable. The actual cost of this product is less than what we pay for the Cannon Port we use now.

We experimented with the use of Fre for a few weeks on Saturday night and only one person commented on the taste. Most of the time all you will taste is the little that clings to the wafer during intinction anyway. And, quite frankly, I'm not sure the taste of communion wine should be a factor in our decision. Is the blood of Christ really to taste good to us? I'll let you ponder that one.

There still may be some folks for whom just the smell of the wine may be an issue and who would refrain from taking that element of communion, but we think this solution is the best we could come up with after months of study.

Hospitality – like sweeping your porch every day; like making sure visitors feel welcome; like caring for our brothers and sisters who come here for whom alcohol is a problem.

Excuse me now. I have to go find my broom, and offer a prayer for a grandmother who taught me about all this.

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Social Ministry Corner Spotlight on: KATHRYN'S KLOSET

Inspired by and named for a woman who gave of herself and shared whatever she had with others, Kathryn Sophia Beasley Hall, Kathryn's Kloset serves as a conduit for corporate gift-in-kind donations by establishing connections between corporate donors and a network of partner non-profit organizations.

Kathryn's Kloset is in reality a large warehouse situated in Baltimore, Maryland, which stores and distributes donated products to partnering agencies who in turn distribute the goods, free of charge, to people in need in the community.

In 2011, Trinity partnered with Diakon's Kathryn's Kloset to receive and donate \$22,440 of product to local ministries. Ministries served included the Ecumenical Food Pantry, Churches Affiliated Child Care Center, Delta Housing/Gaudenzia, CROSS, Susquehanna Harbor, YWCA and Bethesda Women's Shelter. The product received and distributed, primarily liquid detergent was so appreciated that tears of thankfulness were

frequently seen on the faces of the recipients for whom the cost of detergent was out of reach.

The cost of operating and managing the program and warehouse has taken a financial toll on Diakon, the Lutheran Social Service Agency underwriting this program. Beginning in 2012, an administrative fee is being charged for the receipt of product. The structure provides for a greater amount of product for each step in increased fee. Trinity has paid an amount of \$500 in order to receive \$7,500 worth of product during 2012.
