
Bishop Edmiston holds degrees from Gettysburg College, the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, and Penn State University. His pastoral service stretches from Indianapolis to central Pennsylvania, including the Lower Susquehanna Synod where he served as bishop, and beyond. Following retirement, he remains very active with hospital visitations and in his role as Intern Supervisor at Trinity.



Pastor Easton, a graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, was Assistant Pastor at Trinity from 2000 to 2010 and has been Associate Pastor since then. She has served parishes in Duncannon and Dauphin, in addition to being chaplain at Perry Village Nursing

Home in New Bloomfield. Among her many roles at Trinity, Pastor Easton leads contemporary worship.

Pastor Brock, also a graduate of the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, held roles in youth ministry in South Dakota and Connecticut. He served parishes in Elysburg, PA before coming to Trinity in 2002. Pastor Brock leads worship on Saturday evenings and continues to work with youth through the Affirmation of Baptism classes at Trinity.

“Those Pedestrian Moments” The Reverend Glenn E. Ludwig

Not much annoys me these days, and I'm not exactly sure why. Maybe going on Medicare has caused me to gain some wisdom whereby I am more able to separate important from trivial. Or, maybe aging has brought on a case of sloth and I just don't care about as much as I used to. Or, maybe getting older has engendered complacency over curmudgeonly behaviors.

Well, I'll leave it to analysts to figure out the reasons. But there is one thing that does somewhat annoy me even on my better days. It's this – those who always want to universalize their Christian experience and make it the benchmark others need to reach or have or, in this person's eyes, they are not truly Christians.

Let me offer one example to reflect upon. We hear lots of writers and speakers these days who talk about their rather dramatic rescue from the world of drugs, or alcohol, or sex, or any other form of deviant lifestyle. Granted, it is always uplifting to hear such stories. But I think they send a subtle message: if you haven't had such an experience, you don't have the Spirit in you.

Barbara Brown Taylor, in her article that addressed this years ago in *The Christian Century*, said this: “Sometimes I think that those spectacular call stories do more harm than good. . . They also set the bar on divine calling so high that most people walk around feeling short.” Amen, sister, I say, preach on.

Or, let me. I dare say, most of us have not had those kinds of experiences. For us, the faith has come not in a dramatic transformation, but on our mother's lap in church, or in a boring confirmation class, or with sermons that never seemed to end. Anything but dramatic, to be sure. But . . . (and this is a big “but”) the Holy Spirit used those rather pedestrian moments to speak to us. Most of us are more like Nicodemus in John's Gospel, than the paralytic who was healed and jumped for joy in response. God has worked in us slowly, progressively, and over time, so that we know we are a part of the

faith through God's constant faithfulness to us through our history rather than through dramatic events. I learned to sing hymns with gusto at the elbow of my alto mother. I witnessed faithfulness in my grandmother who drove to church by herself well into her nineties. I experienced God's grace in the many times I heard and appropriated the words of forgiveness spoken to my heart. I have seen God at work in the ordinary events of daily life; nothing extraordinary, nothing spectacular, but grace-moments nonetheless.

So, I clap the person on the back that has had the life-changing experience. But I also reserve some support for those whose lives are changed in their daily walk with God. My hunch is that is most of us reading this article. Come Holy Spirit and be our guest – within and among us.

Social Ministry Corner

Trinity Reaches Out to the Homeless Every Week at St. Pat's

Every Saturday morning a faithful group of volunteers arrive just as dawn is breaking at St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Cathedral on State Street in Harrisburg to begin cooking breakfast. This isn't exactly a social gathering, but the breakfast for the area's homeless men and women provides much needed social contact along with food nourishment, warmth, temporary shelter and generous helpings of Christian love. The breakfast is served year round each Saturday between 7:15-8:15 a.m. in the lower level fellowship hall of the cathedral. The number of homeless served breakfast varies from 60-90 during summer months to as many as 90-150 during the winter.

Trinity presently has 18 volunteers who support and help with this breakfast program on a rotating schedule. One or two of our Trinity disciples are scheduled to work each week from 6-8:30 a.m., usually two or three times during each six month period. We welcome more folks from Trinity to consider joining our group of volunteers; interested persons may call our congregational coordinator Nancy Restagno at 938-4035. Trinity's Social Ministry budget also supplies some funding to purchase food needed to serve the breakfasts.

Another opportunity for service through St. Patrick's Cathedral to help those in need has recently come to Trinity's attention. We are currently working out details to collect and deliver gently used items once or twice a year to the St. Pat's Shining Light Gift Shop in uptown Harrisburg. Donated clothing and home items are sold at bargain prices to those in need from the low income community. Watch for more details about the project.

HEALTH TIP:

With summer traveling season upon us, here are some reminders when flying or on long trips. Research shows that sitting for long periods in an airplane can double your chances of getting a blood clot in your leg. That's a danger, as clots can travel and block blood and oxygen flow to major organs and cause organ damage – even a heart attack or stroke. So if you fly, walk the aisle once or twice every hour or so – and on long car trips, do the same at rest stops. This will get the blood flowing and prevent that clot from happening.
