


Moderators will be Craig Erdman and Lynn DeSantis, representing the Stewardship Committee.

Greetings to all in the name of the Lord. The YG (youth group) season is back for 2013. New YG NITES, new retreats, new events, and new friendships all await our YG participants. A lot of hard work has gone into this year to make it a success. The calendar is the most jam-packed that it has ever been. There is truly something on almost every weekend. It will be all good!

I wanted to take some time to talk about the SR. HIGH SERVICE TRIP we went on from Sunday, July 14 to Saturday, July 20. For this trip, 12 of our Sr. High YG and 4 of our advisors went to Birmingham, Alabama with the local organization LutheranHANDS. Altogether there were around 150 people on this trip from different churches. We traveled by bus and it took about 14 hours to get there. Once we arrived we had dinner and had a Large Group time to get set for the week of service. Each day, we worked at our sites from about 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. having lunch at our site.

We served in a section of Birmingham known as Pratt City. This was the section that was hardest hit by the 2010 tornados that rocked the city. Some of the site projects that small group teams worked on were: rebuilding a roof, building a wheelchair ramp, building



an entryway to a church, working in charity food distribution warehouse, landscaping, painting and landscaping around homes and churches. I myself was involved a small group which was tasked with tearing down a rotting deck and building a new one.

Once each work day concluded we went back to the church that we were all staying at for dinner and Large Group worship and fellowship. Then we got some "family time" each night to spend with our individual youth groups in prayer and conversation. Then it was off to bed. This was the schedule for most of the week. Once one project finished, people were moved to another that needed help. There were always projects that needed attention. Friday we worked in the morning at the various sites and then showered up and got to spend the rest of the day at a state park near Birmingham for some much need rest and relaxation. All and all it was an awesome and rewarding week. We made a difference! It might be a small one in the grand scheme of things, but we did make a difference to the people we served.

Now that I've looked back, it's time to look forward to all of the awesome times that await our YG this coming season. I am excited for it all. It will be great year!

Fair Trade Coffee, Tea and Chocolate!

On the first Sunday of every month, you probably see the display table with coffee, tea, and chocolates in the Gathering Space and ask, "Why do we sell these items and where does that money do?"

These items are part of the Fair Trade project of Lutheran World Relief (LWR). Buying fair trade items supports small-scale farmers to participate in the global marketplace without being exploited. Fair Trade principles include:

- ▶ Fairness -- Producers from poor, remote regions of the world can compete with big corporations from wealthy countries, and farmers receive a fair price based on their cost of production, cost of living and product quality.
- ▶ Protecting children. Children are not forced to work at the expense of going to school.
- ▶ Supporting women's rights.
- ▶ Good stewardship of resources and the environment and

observing strict regulations that protect natural resources for future generations.

Ana Rosa Diaz, a 20-year-old mother from La Pintada, Nicaragua wants to provide her newborn daughter with a better life. The small town holds few opportunities and she is currently unemployed.

Ana, however, recently joined a women's cooperative called "La Fortaleza." LWR supports La Fortaleza's training of women on chocolate-making, packaging and marketing.

The group represents efforts by LWR to bring women into the cocoa value chain. Women and their families grow cocoa and increase their earnings by processing it into chocolate and chocolate products, such as hot chocolate, to sell.

Ana is hopeful: "I want to make money from our chocolates so life will be a little easier."

Fair trade is more than just business as usual. Fair trade proves that compassion and integrity are possible and a successful business can put people first. Great stuff for a great cause!

Stewardship at Home - A Plan

This month's column is continued from the topic introduced in the August edition of Trinity Parish.


Let's look at the items that you control: your expenditures. You might reduce, delay or eliminate expenses on clothing, entertainment or transportation, for example. Selecting expenditures to reduce is not easy; and actually saying NO to an expense takes *discipline* and personal fortitude. Saying NO to yourself or a family member is an essential discipline.

Over time you may be able to increase your income. But the more important form of self-control is to know where your money is being spent - and to "live within your means" and then, "to increase your means." *This is how to save money.*

Seeing where our expenditures occur, adjusting the way we spend our income (even, perhaps, someday creating a budget) will increase the satisfaction and enjoyment we receive from our lifestyle. If you need help, try Thrivent, or a financial advisor, or a trusted friend who is good with money.

One last thought for this month. If you wish to save more for the future, or help your family, or increase your charitable giving, you should include *savings as a monthly fixed expense*. Many people put aside *retirement savings* or bank savings each month – a great habit! Decide how much you want to save each month (\$5, or \$50, or \$500 for example), and list it as the *first* expense in your monthly list, each month! Then save the money, first! Put it into a savings or retirement account. Don't spend it!

No matter what your current situation, NOW is a great time to document your spending and income, and to make sure you are spending (and saving) in a way that is satisfying to you and your loved ones, and assists you in reaching your goals. Go get your budgeting tools and get started. God, Gifts, Gratitude, Grace: Stewardship in Action.

Social Ministry Corner: The DELTA Community

The DELTA Community, a program of the Gaudenzia Foundation, is a Harrisburg-based transitional program for single-parent, homeless families, who are working toward self-sufficiency. DELTA is an acronym for Developing Effective Living Through Alternatives. DELTA provides up to 24 months housing support for homeless families in the form of rent subsidies and life skills coaching. They encourage better parenting and home management skills, achieving GED or other educational goals and other employment.

Among the families who have completed the program since 1989, more than 85 percent have maintained permanent housing, increased their earning capacity, self-esteem and self-determination, and are able to make better decisions for their families.

Trinity volunteers support DELTA participants two or three times a year through Family Night Out. Volunteers prepare food at Trinity, transport it to a kitchen in Harrisburg, serve the meal, provide childcare and share genuine hospitality. Providing just one meal can be the first step in moving families from survival to personal change.

Additionally, through the Social Ministry Committee's Giving Tree project each December, Trinity friends have donated generously to help extend the Christmas season for DELTA families. Recipients tell us these gifts are a reminder that a caring faith

community is near and supports them in their spiritual growth.

Parish Ministry Corner Health Tip:

In the U. S. alone, more than half of all adults don't get the preventative tests they need. And some get tests they do not need! Here is a helpful list to follow:

- ▶ Experts recommend screenings for blood pressure, cholesterol, osteoporosis (men also), cardiovascular risk assessment, and vision and hearing periodically after 65.
- ▶ For women, a Pap test every one to three years to age 65 and a mammogram every one to two years after age 40 is recommended.
- ▶ Talk with your doctor about screenings for colorectal cancer, and prostate for men, as recommendations vary by test and by patient.

DID YOU KNOW?

The **IRA qualified dividend charitable distribution** is available again in 2013. A direct gift to Trinity from your IRA could:

1. Be excluded from your gross income as a qualified charitable deduction; and
2. Count toward your required minimum distribution (RMD).

To qualify you must be 70 and a half or older and the gift must go directly from your IRA to Trinity. Your total IRA gifts for 2013 may not exceed \$100,000.
